



You are not a God who takes pleasure in wickedness; evil cannot dwell with You. (Psalm 5:4)

I will give thanks to You, O Lord, because of Your righteousness. I will sing praise to Your name, O Lord Most High. (Psalm 7:17)

O Lord, You reign forever. You have established Your throne for judgment. You will judge the world in righteousness, and You will govern the peoples with justice. You, O Lord, will also be a refuge for the oppressed, a stronghold in times of trouble. Those who know Your name will trust in You, for You, Lord, have never forsaken those who seek You. (Psalm 9:7–10)

You, O Lord, are righteous; You love righteousness; the upright will see Your face. (Psalm 11:7)

As for You, O God, Your way is perfect; Your word, O Lord, is proven. You are a shield to all who take refuge in You. For who is God besides You, Lord? And who is the Rock except You, our God? (Psalm 18:30–31)

Your law, O Lord, is perfect, restoring the soul. Your testimony, O Lord, is sure, making wise the simple. Your precepts, O Lord, are right, rejoicing the heart. Your commandment, O Lord, is pure, enlightening the eyes. The fear of You, O Lord, is clean, enduring forever. Your judgments, O Lord, are true and altogether righteous. They are more desirable than gold, than much pure gold; they are sweeter than honey, than honey from the comb. Moreover, by them is Your servant warned; in keeping them there is great reward. I will exalt You, Lord my God, and worship You, for You, Lord God, are holy. (Psalm 99:9)

I will enter Your gates, O Lord, with thanksgiving and Your courts with praise; I will give thanks to You and bless Your name. For You are good and Your lovingkindness endures forever; Your faithfulness continues through all generations. (Psalm 100:4–5)

O Lord, You execute righteousness and justice for all who are oppressed. You are compassionate and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in lovingkindness. (Psalm 103:6, 8)

I will give thanks to You, O Lord, for You are good; Your loving kindness endures forever. I will give thanks to You, Lord, for Your unfailing love and Your wonderful acts to Your people, for You satisfy the thirsty soul and fill the hungry soul with good things. (Psalm 107:1, 8–9)

Your merciful love is higher than the heavens, O Lord, and Your truth reaches to the skies. (Psalm 108:4)

Great are Your works, O Lord; they are pondered by all who delight in them. Splendid and majestic is Your work, and Your righteousness endures forever. You have caused Your wonderful acts to be remembered; You, Lord, are gracious and compassionate. (Psalm 111:2–4)

Your word is settled in heaven forever, O Lord. Your faithfulness continues through all generations. You established the earth, and it stands. Your laws continue to this day according to Your purposes, for all things serve You. (Psalm 119:89–91)

Your testimonies, which You have commanded, are righteous and trustworthy. Your righteousness is everlasting, and Your law is truth. (Psalm 119:138, 142)

How precious are Your thoughts to me, O God! How vast is the sum of them! If I should count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand. When I awake, I am still with You. (Psalm 139:17–18)

You, O Lord of hosts, will be exalted in judgment; You, the holy God, will show Yourself holy in righteousness. (Isaiah 5:16)

Lord, You long to be gracious and rise to show compassion. For You, O Lord, are a God of justice; blessed are all those who wait for You! (Isaiah 30:18)

You, O Lord, are our judge, You are our lawgiver, You are our king; it is You who will save us. (Isaiah 33:22)

It pleased You, O Lord, for the sake of Your righteousness, to make Your law great and glorious. (Isaiah 42:21)

Only in You, Lord, are righteousness and strength. (Isaiah 45:24)

You, O Lord, have declared: "My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways My ways. As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways, and My thoughts than your thoughts." (Isaiah 55:8–9)

Lord of hosts, You judge righteously and test my heart and mind. To You I have committed my cause. (Jeremiah 11:20)

I call this to mind, and therefore I have hope: Your mercies, O Lord, never cease, for Your compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness. (Lamentations 3:21–23)

I know that You are a gracious and compassionate God, slow to anger and abounding in lovingkindness, a God who relents from sending calamity. (Jonah 4:2)

O Lord, You are good, a refuge in times of trouble; You know those who trust in You. (Nahum 1:7)

Your eyes are too pure to look at evil; You cannot look on wickedness, my holy God. (Habakkuk 1:13)

My soul magnifies You, O Lord, and my spirit rejoices in You, God my Savior, for You, Mighty One, have done great things for me, and holy is Your name. Your mercy is on those who fear You, from generation to generation. (Luke 1:46—47, 49–50)

Oh, the depth of the riches of Your wisdom and knowledge, O God! How unsearchable are Your judgments and Your ways past finding out! For who has known Your mind, O Lord? Or who has been Your counselor? Or who has first given to You, that You should repay? For from You and through You and to You are all things. To You be the glory forever! Amen. (Romans 11:33–36)

Blessed are You, O God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and the God of all comfort. (2 Corinthians 1:3)

In You, O Christ, are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. (Colossians 2:3)

O Lord, You are not slow concerning Your promise, as some count slowness, but are patient with us, not wanting anyone to perish, but for all to come to repentance. (2 Peter 3:9)

You, O God, are light; in You there is no darkness at all. (1 John 1:5)

Great and marvelous are Your works, Lord God Almighty! Righteous and true are Your ways, King of the nations! Who will not fear You, O Lord, and glorify Your name? For You alone are holy. All nations will come and worship before You, for Your righteous acts have been revealed. (Revelation 15:3–4)

Hallelujah! Salvation and glory and power belong to You, our God, because Your judgments are true and righteous. (Revelation 19:1–2)

THE WORKS OF GOD

Creation

In the beginning, O God, You created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, and darkness was over the surface of the deep, and Your Spirit, O God, was hovering over the face of the waters. And, O God, You said, "Let there be light," and there was light. And You, O God, saw that the light was good, and You separated the light from the darkness. You called the light "day," and the darkness You called "night." So the evening and the morning were the first day. (Genesis 1:5–10)

O God, You said, "Let Us make man in Our image, in Our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air and over the livestock and over all the earth and over all the creatures that creep on the earth." So You created man in Your own image; in Your image, O God, You created him; male and female You created them. Then You blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it; and rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air and over every living creature that moves on the earth." Then You, O God, said, "Behold, I have given you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it; they will be yours for food. And to all the beasts of the earth and all the birds of the air and all the creatures that move on the ground, in which there is life, I have given every green plant for food"; and it was so. You, O God, saw all that You had made, and it was very good. So the evening and the morning were the sixth day. (Genesis 1:26–31)

O God, You completed the heavens and the earth in all their vast array. By the seventh day You finished the work that You had done, and You rested on the seventh day from all Your creative work. And You blessed the seventh day and sanctified it, because on it You rested from all the work of creating that You had done. (Genesis 2:1–3)

O Lord, in six days You made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore You blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Exodus 20:11)

You alone are the Lord. You made the heavens, even the heaven of heavens, and all their starry host, the earth and all that is on it, the seas and all that is in them. You give life to all that is in them, and the host of heaven worships You. (Nehemiah 9:6)

When I consider Your heavens, the work of Your fingers, the moon and the stars, which You have set in place, what is man that You are mindful of him, and the son of man that You care for him? You made him a little lower than the heavenly beings and crowned him with glory and honor. You made human beings the rulers over the works of Your hands, and You put everything under their feet. (Psalm 8:3–6)

The heavens declare Your glory, O God, and the skies proclaim the work of Your hands. Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they reveal knowledge. (Psalm 19:1–2)

The earth is Yours, O Lord, and everything in it, the world and all who dwell in it. For You founded it upon the seas and established it upon the waters. (Psalm 24:1–2)

O Mighty One, God, the Lord, You have spoken and summoned the earth from the rising of the sun to the place where it sets. (Psalm 50:1)

Every animal of the forest is Yours, and the cattle on a thousand hills, O God. You know every bird in the mountains, and everything that moves in the field is Yours. (Psalm 50:10–11)

You answer us with awesome deeds of righteousness, O God of our salvation, You who are the hope of all the ends of the earth and of the farthest seas. You formed the mountains by Your strength, having armed Yourself with power. You stilled the roaring of the seas, the roaring of their waves, and the tumult of the peoples. (Psalm 65:5–7)

The day is Yours, O God; the night also is Yours; You established the sun and moon. It was You who set all the boundaries of the earth; You made both summer and winter. (Psalm 74:16–17)

You, O Lord, are the great God, the great King above all gods. In Your hand are the depths of the earth; the summits of the mountains are Yours also. The sea is Yours, for You made it, and Your hands formed the dry land. You are our God and we are the people of Your pasture and the sheep under Your care. (Psalm 95:3–5, 7)

O Lord, You formed my inward parts. You wove me together in my mother's womb. I thank You because I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Your works are wonderful, and my soul knows it full well. My frame was not hidden from You when I was made in secret and skillfully wrought in the depths of the earth. Your eyes saw my embryo, and all the days ordained for me were written in Your book before one of them came to be. (Psalm 139:13–16)

By wisdom, O Lord, You founded the earth; by understanding You established the heavens; by Your knowledge the deeps were divided, and the clouds drop down the dew. (Proverbs 3:19–20)

O God, You have made everything beautiful in its time. You have also set eternity in our hearts; yet we cannot fathom what You have done from beginning to end. (Ecclesiastes 3:11)

It is You, O Lord, who measured the waters in the hollow of Your hand. You marked off the heavens with the breadth of Your hand. You have calculated the dust of the earth in a measure, and weighed the mountains in the balance and the hills in scales. (Isaiah 40:12)

You, O Holy One, have asked, "To whom will You compare Me? Or who is My equal?" We lift our eyes to the heavens and see who has created them. You bring out the starry host by number and call them each by name. Because of Your great might and the strength of Your power, not one of them is missing. Do we not know? Have we not heard? You are the everlasting God, the Lord, the Creator of the ends of the earth. You do not grow tired or weary. No one can fathom Your understanding. (Isaiah 40:25–26, 28)

You form the light and create darkness; You bring prosperity and create disaster; You, O Lord, do all these things. (Isaiah 45:7)

You are the Lord who created the heavens, You are God. You fashioned and made the earth and established it; You did not create it to be empty but formed it to be inhabited. You are the Lord, and there is no other. (Isaiah 45:18)

Your hand, O Lord, laid the foundations of the earth, and Your right hand spread out the heavens; when You summon them, they all stand up together. (Isaiah 48:13)

Heaven is Your throne, O Lord, and the earth is Your footstool. Your hand made all these things, and so they came into being. (Isaiah 66:1–2)

You, O Lord, give the sun for light by day and decree the moon and stars for light by night; You stir up the sea so that its waves roar—the Lord of hosts is Your name. (Jeremiah 31:35)

O Lord, You made the earth by Your power; You established the world by Your wisdom and stretched out the heavens by Your understanding. (Jeremiah 51:15)

O Lord God of hosts—You who touch the earth and it melts, and all who live in it mourn; You who build Your staircase in the heavens and lay its foundation over the earth; You who call for the waters of the sea and pour them out over the face of the earth—the Lord is Your name. (Amos 9:5–6)

Through You, O Christ, all things were made, and without You nothing was made that has been made. In You was life, and that life was a light for all people. (John 1:3–4)

God, You made the world and everything in it. You are Lord of heaven and earth; You do not dwell in temples built by hands. You are not served by human hands, as though You needed anything, since You Yourself give life and breath and everything else to all people. (Acts 17:24–25)

Since the creation of the world, Your invisible attributes, O God—Your eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen, revealed in what You have made, so that people are without excuse. (Romans 1:20)

You, O God, give life to the dead and call into being things that do not exist. (Romans 4:17)

The whole family in heaven and on earth derives its name from You, the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. (Ephesians 3:14–15)

Christ, You are the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For by You all things were created that are in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities; all things were created by You and for You. And You are before all things, and in You all things hold together. (Colossians 1:15–17)

Everything You created is good, O God, and I am to reject nothing but receive it with thanksgiving, because it is sanctified by Your word and prayer. (1 Timothy 4:4–5)

In the past, O God, You spoke to the fathers through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days You have spoken to us by Your Son, whom You appointed heir of all things, and through whom You made the universe. (Hebrews 1:1–2)

By faith I understand that the universe was formed by Your word, O God, so that what is seen was not made out of things which are visible. (Hebrews 11:3)

You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honor and power, for You created all things, and by Your will they were created and have their being. (Revelation 4:11)

Redemption

Because Adam listened to the voice of his wife and ate from the tree about which You, O God, commanded him, "You must not eat of it," the ground was cursed; through painful toil he ate of it all the days of his life. It produced thorns and thistles for him, and he ate the plants of the field. By the sweat of his brow he ate his food until he returned to the ground, because from it he was taken; "for dust you are and to dust you will return." (Genesis 3:17–19)

The earth became corrupt in Your sight, O God, and was filled with violence. You looked upon the earth and saw how corrupt it had become, for all the people on earth had corrupted their ways. (Genesis 6:11–12)

You, O God, blessed Noah and his sons, and told them to be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth. You established Your covenant with them and with their descendants after them and with every living creature that was with them—the birds, the livestock and all the beasts of the earth, all those that came out of the ark with them—every living creature on earth. You, O God, established Your covenant that never again will all life be cut off by the waters of a flood; never again will there be a flood to destroy the earth. The

sign of Your covenant, O God, for all generations to come is the rainbow that You set in the clouds; whenever a rainbow appears in the clouds, You will remember Your everlasting covenant with humankind and every living creature of every kind on the earth. (Genesis 9:1, 9–16)

O Lord, You said to Abraham, "By Myself I have sworn, that because you have not withheld your son, your only son, I will surely bless you and make your descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as the sand on the seashore. Your descendants will take possession of the cities of their enemies, and through your offspring all nations on earth will be blessed, because you have obeyed My voice." (Genesis 22:16–18)

May my faith be like Joseph's when he said to his brothers, "Do not be grieved or angry with yourselves for selling me here, for God sent me before you to save lives. He sent me ahead of you to preserve for you a remnant on earth and to save your lives by a great deliverance. So it was not you who sent me here, but God." (Genesis 45:5, 7–8)

In Your unfailing love You led the people You redeemed. In Your strength You guided them to Your holy dwelling. You brought them in and planted them in the mountain of Your inheritance—the place, O Lord, You made for Your dwelling; the sanctuary, O Lord, Your hands established. (Exodus 15:13, 17)

The children of Israel were a people holy to You, the Lord their God. Lord God, You chose them out of all the peoples on the face of the earth to be Your people, Your treasured possession. Lord, You did not set Your love on them and choose them because they were more numerous than other peoples, for they were the fewest of all peoples. But it was because You loved them, Lord, and kept the oath You swore to their fathers that You brought them out with a mighty hand and redeemed them from the house of slavery, from the hand of Pharaoh of Egypt. (Deuteronomy 7:6–8)

Lord, You are our praise, and You are our God, who performed for the children of Israel those great and awesome wonders which they saw with their own eyes. (Deuteronomy 10:21)

You set before Your people life and prosperity, death and destruction; and You commanded them to love You, the Lord their God, to walk in Your ways, and to keep Your commandments, statutes, and judgments, so that they would live and multiply and that You would bless them in the land they were entering to possess. You called heaven and earth as witnesses against them that You set before them life and death, blessings and curses, and told them to choose life, so that they and their children would live by loving You, listening to Your voice, and holding fast to You. (Deuteronomy 30:15–16, 19–20)

Blessed are You, Lord, who have not left Your people without a kinsman-redeemer. (Ruth 4:14)

You, O Lord, do not save by sword or by spear, for the battle is Yours. (1 Samuel 17:47)

With the kind You show Yourself kind; with the blameless You show Yourself blameless; with the pure You show Yourself pure; but to the crooked You show Yourself shrewd. You save the humble, but Your eyes are on the haughty to bring them low. (2 Samuel 22:26–28)

O Lord, if we your people, who are called by Your name, will humble ourselves and pray and seek Your face and turn from our wicked ways, then You will hear from heaven and will forgive our sin and heal our land. (2 Chronicles 7:14)

Your eyes, O Lord, move to and fro throughout the whole earth to strengthen those whose hearts are fully committed to You. (2 Chronicles 16:9)

Lord, You save the humble but bring low those whose eyes are haughty. (Psalm 18:27)

Lord, You guide the humble in what is right and teach the humble Your way. (Psalm 25:9)

Blessed is the nation whose God is You, Lord, the people whom You have chosen for Your inheritance. (Psalm 33:12)

I will praise You forever for what You have done; I will hope in Your name, for it is good. I will praise You in the presence of Your saints. (Psalm 52:9)

Be blessed, Lord God, the God of Israel; You alone do wonderful things. (Psalm 72:18)

I will remember Your works, O Lord; surely I will remember Your wonders of long ago. I will meditate on all Your works and consider all Your mighty deeds. Your way, O God, is holy. What god is so great as You? You are the God who works wonders; You have revealed Your strength among the peoples. You redeemed your people with Your power, the descendants of Jacob and Joseph. (Psalm 77:11–15)

One generation shall praise Your works to another, O Lord, and shall declare Your mighty acts. I will meditate on the glorious splendor of Your majesty and on Your wonderful works. Many shall speak of the might of Your awesome works, and I will proclaim Your great deeds. (Psalm 145:4–6)

O Lord, You uphold all who fall and lift up all who are bowed down. The eyes of all look to You, and You give them their food at the proper time. You open Your hand and satisfy the desire of every living thing. (Psalm 145:14–16)

You, O Lord, are near to all who call upon You, to all who call upon You in truth. You fulfill the desires of those who fear You; You hear

their cry and save them. You preserve all who love You, but all the wicked You will destroy. (Psalm 145:18–20)

You, O Lord, watch over the strangers; You sustain the orphan and the widow, but You thwart the way of the wicked. (Psalm 146:9)

We praise You, Jesus, that God's word is fulfilled in You:

You will come forth a Shoot from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The Spirit of the Lord will rest on You—the Spirit of wisdom and of understanding, the Spirit of counsel and of power, the Spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord—and You will delight in the fear of the Lord. You will not judge by what You see with Your eyes, or decide by what You hear with Your ears, but with righteousness You will judge the poor and decide with fairness for the meek of the earth, and You will strike the earth with the rod of Your mouth; with the breath of Your lips You will slay the wicked. Righteousness will be Your belt and faithfulness the sash around Your waist. (Isaiah 11:1–5)

O God, You give strength to the weary and increase the power of the weak. Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but we who wait for You, O Lord, will renew our strength. We will mount up with wings like eagles; we will run and not grow weary; we will walk and not be faint. (Isaiah 40:29–31)

Shout for joy, O heavens! Rejoice, O earth! Break out into singing, O mountains! For You, O Lord, have comforted Your people and will have compassion on Your afflicted. (Isaiah 49:13)

Lord, You have bared Your holy arm in the sight of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth will see Your salvation, O God. (Isaiah 52:10)

O Servant of God, people despised and rejected You; You were a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief. And like one from whom people hide their faces, You were despised, and we did not esteem You. Surely You have borne our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered You stricken, smitten by God and afflicted. But You were pierced for our transgressions; You were crushed for our iniquities. The punishment that brought us peace was upon You, and by Your wounds we are healed. All of us like sheep have gone astray, all of us have turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on You the iniquity of us all. (Isaiah 53:3–6)

Surely Your hand, O Lord, is not too short to save, nor Your ear too dull to hear. But our iniquities have separated us from You, our God. Our sins have hidden Your face from us, so that You will not hear. Yet You, Lord, saw that there was no one to intervene; so Your own arm worked salvation for You, and Your righteousness sustained You. You put on righteousness as Your breastplate, and the helmet of salvation on Your head. You put on the garments of vengeance and wrapped Yourself in zeal as a cloak. From the west, many will fear Your name, O Lord, and from the rising of the sun, they will revere Your glory. For You will come like a flood that Your breath drives along. (Isaiah 59:1–2, 16–19)

Nations will come to Your light and kings to the brightness of your dawning. (Isaiah 60:3)

As the earth brings forth its sprouts and as a garden causes that which is sown to spring up, so You, Lord God, will make righteousness and praise spring up before all nations. (Isaiah 61:11)

I will tell of Your lovingkindnesses, O Lord, Your praises, according to all You have done for us, and Your great goodness toward the house of Israel, which You have bestowed on them according to Your mercies and according to the multitude of Your lovingkindnesses. (Isaiah 63:7)

I will sing to You, Lord, and give praise to You, Lord, for You have rescued the life of the needy from the hands of evildoers. (Jeremiah 20:13)

Lord, thank You for Your promise to us:

"I will put My law within you and write it on your hearts. I will be your God, and you will be My people. No longer will you teach your neighbor, nor will you teach a friend, saying, 'Know the Lord,' because You shall all know Me, from the least of you to the greatest. For I will forgive your iniquity and will remember your sins no more." (Jeremiah 31:33–34)

You, Lord God, take no pleasure in the death of the wicked but are pleased when the wicked turn from their ways and live. (Ezekiel 18:23; 33:11)

O Lord, You led Your people with cords of human kindness, with bands of love; You lifted the yoke from their neck and bent down to feed them. (Hosea 11:4)

Who is a God like You, who pardons iniquity and forgives the transgression of the remnant of Your inheritance? You do not stay angry forever but delight to show mercy. You will have compassion on Your people; You will tread their iniquities underfoot and hurl all their sins into the depths of the sea. (Micah 7:18–19)

Lord, I have heard of Your fame, and I stand in awe of Your deeds. O Lord, revive Your work in the midst of the years, in our time make them known; in wrath remember mercy. (Habakkuk 3:2)

For those who revere Your name, O Lord Almighty, the sun of righteousness will rise with healing in his wings. And they will go out and leap like calves released from the stall. (Malachi 4:2)

Behold, a virgin was with child and gave birth to a son, and they called You Immanuel, which means, "God with us." (Matthew 1:23)

After Your baptism and temptation, Jesus, You began to preach and say, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Matthew 4:17)

You, O Son of Man, have authority on earth to forgive sins. (Matthew 9:6)

Jesus, wherever You went, the blind received sight, the lame walked, the lepers were cured, the deaf heard, the dead were raised and the good news was preached to the poor. (Matthew 11:5)

We can come to You, Lord Jesus Christ, for to all of us who are weary and burdened, You will give rest. We can take up Your yoke and learn from You, for You are gentle and humble in heart, and we will find rest for our souls. For Your yoke is easy, and Your burden is light. (Matthew 11:28–30)

Jesus, You who are the Son of Man, did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give Your life as a ransom for many. (Matthew 20:28)

Jesus, we praise You that You taught us to remember You—You took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it to Your disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is My body." You took the cup, gave thanks and offered it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you. This is My blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." (Matthew 26:26–28)

It is not the healthy who need a physician, but the sick. You, Jesus, have not come to call the righteous, but sinners. (Mark 2:17)

Jesus, You did all things well. You made the deaf hear and the mute speak. (Mark 7:37)

If I am ashamed of You and Your words in this adulterous and sinful generation, O Son of Man, You will be ashamed of me when You come in the glory of Your Father with the holy angels. (Mark 8:38)

You, O Son of Man, did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give Your life as a ransom for many. (Mark 10:45)

You, O Lord, have performed mighty deeds with Your arm; You have scattered those who are proud in the thoughts of their heart. You have brought down rulers from their thrones and have lifted up the humble. (Luke 1:51–52)

Blessed are You, O Lord, God of Israel, because You have visited us and have redeemed Your people. You have raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of Your servant David (as You spoke by the mouth of Your holy prophets of long ago), salvation from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us—to show mercy to our fathers and to remember Your holy covenant, the oath You swore to our father Abraham: to rescue us from the hand of our enemies, and to enable us to serve You without fear in holiness and righteousness before You all our days. (Luke 1:68–75)

John was called Your prophet, O Most High; for he went on before You to prepare the way for You, and to give Your people the knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins because of Your tender mercy, O God, with which the sunrise from on high came from heaven to shine on those living in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide their feet into the path of peace. (Luke 1:76–79)

The angel said to the shepherds, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For today in the city of David a Savior has been born to you, who is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2:10–11)

You, O Jesus, cured many who had diseases, sicknesses, and evil spirits, and gave sight to many who were blind. So You replied to the messengers sent from John the Baptist, "Go back and report to John what you have seen and heard: The blind receive sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cured, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the good news is preached to the poor. And blessed is he who does not fall away on account of Me." (Luke 7:21–23)

You, Jesus, the Son of Man, came to seek and to save that which was lost. (Luke 19:10)

Blessed are You, O King, who come in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory in the highest! (Luke 19:38)

The Scriptures predicted that You, Christ Jesus, would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins would be preached in Your name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. (Luke 24:46–47)

O Christ, You were in the world, and the world was made through You, and the world did not know You. You came to Your own, but Your own did not receive You. (John 1:10–11)

From Your fullness, O Christ, we have all received grace upon grace. For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through You, Jesus Christ. (John 1:16–17)

Jesus, You are the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. (John 1:29)

God so loved the world that He gave You, Jesus, His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in You should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send You into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through You. (John 3:16–17)

You who come from above are above all; he who is from the earth belongs to the earth and speaks as one from the earth. You who come from heaven are above all. You, whom God has sent, speak the words of God, for You give the Spirit without limit. (John 3:31, 34)

Just as the Father raises the dead and gives them life, even so You, the Son, give life to whom You wish. (John 5:21)

All these testified that You, Jesus, are the Son of God: John the Baptist, the works that You did, the Father and the Scriptures. (John 5:31–39)

It is the Spirit who gives life; the flesh counts for nothing. The words You spoke, Jesus, are spirit and are life. (John 6:63)

While You were in the world, Jesus, You were the light of the world. For judgment You came into this world, that those who do not see may see, and that those who see may become blind. (John 9:5, 39)

You are the good Shepherd, Lord Jesus; You lay down Your life for the sheep. You are the good Shepherd; You know Your sheep and Your sheep know You—just as the Father knows You and You know the Father—and You lay down Your life for the sheep. (John 10:11, 14–15)

Lord Jesus, You are the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in You will live, even though they die, and those who live and believe in You will never die. (John 11:25–26)

You, Jesus, have come as a light into the world, that whoever believes in You should not stay in darkness. You do not judge those who hear Your words but do not keep them, for You did not come to judge the world, but to save the world. (John 12:46–47)

Now are You glorified, O Son of Man, and God is glorified in You. If God is glorified in You, God will glorify You, the Son, in Himself and will glorify You immediately. (John 13:31–32)

In Your Father's house are many dwellings, Lord Jesus; if it were not so, You would have told us. You went there to prepare a place for us. And as You went to prepare a place for us, You will come again and receive us to Yourself, that we also may be where You are. (John 14:2–3)

Holy Spirit, You convict the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment. (John 16:8)

Jesus, You came from the Father and entered the world; now You have left the world and gone back to the Father. (John 16:28)

The Father granted You, the Son, authority over all people that You might give eternal life to as many as He has given You. (John 17:2)

Jesus, we thank You that You did not ask that the Father take us out of the world but that He protect us from the evil one when You prayed: "Father, I desire those You have given Me to be with Me where I am, that they may behold My glory, the glory You have given Me because You loved Me before the foundation of the world." (John 17:15, 24)

Lord, grant to us the power of the Spirit that you promised the apostles when You told them: "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you; and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8)

Jesus, You are the stone that was rejected by the builders, but that has become the chief cornerstone. Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to us by which we can be saved. (Acts 4:11–12)

You, O God of our fathers, raised up Jesus who was killed by hanging on a tree. You exalted Him to Your own right hand as Prince and Savior, that He might give repentance and forgiveness of sins to Israel. (Acts 5:30–31)

God, You do not show favoritism but accept those from every nation who fear You and do what is right. (Acts 10:34–35)

God, You sent Your word to the children of Israel, telling the good news of peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all. Jesus commanded the apostles to preach to the people and to testify that He is the One whom You appointed as judge of the living and the dead. To Him all the prophets witness that, through His name, everyone who believes in Him receives forgiveness of sins. (Acts 10:36, 42–43)

As the gospel spread to the Gentiles, many rejoiced and glorified Your word, O Lord, and all who were appointed for eternal life believed. (Acts 13:48)

In the past, O God, You overlooked the times of ignorance, but now You command all people everywhere to repent. For You have set a day when You will judge the world with justice by the Man You have appointed. You have given assurance of this to all people by raising Him from the dead. (Acts 17:30–31)

God, You promised the gospel beforehand through Your prophets in the Holy Scriptures concerning Your Son—who was a descendant of David according to the flesh, and who was declared with power to be Your Son, according to the Spirit of holiness, by Your resurrection from the dead—Jesus Christ our Lord. (Romans 1:2–4)

We know that whatever the law says, it says to those who are under the law, that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world held accountable to You, O God, because no one will be justified in Your sight by the works of the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin. (Romans 3:19–20)

Apart from the law, Your righteousness, O God, has been made known, being witnessed by the Law and the Prophets, even Your righteousness through faith in Jesus Christ to all who believe. For there is no difference, for all have sinned and fall short of Your glory, O God, being justified freely by Your grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus. (Romans 3:21–24)

O God, our Father, You presented Christ as a sacrifice of atonement through faith in His blood. You did this to demonstrate Your

righteousness at the present time, because in Your mercy, You passed over the sins committed before Jesus died. You did it to demonstrate Your righteousness in the present time, that You might be just and the justifier of those who have faith in Jesus. (Romans 3:25–26)

You, O God, will impute righteousness to us who believe in You who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead. Jesus was delivered over to death because of our sins and was raised in order to make us right with You. (Romans 4:24–25)

At the right time, when we were helpless, Christ died for the ungodly. For rarely will anyone die for one who is righteous, though perhaps for a good person someone might even dare to die. But You, O God, demonstrate Your own love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:6–8)

If by the trespass of the one man, death reigned through that one man, much more will we, who receive the abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness, reign in life through You, the one Man, Jesus Christ. Consequently, just as the result of one trespass was condemnation for all of us, so also the result of one act of righteousness was justification that brings life for all of us. For just as through the disobedience of the one man the many were made sinners, so also through Your obedience, O Son of Man, many will be made righteous. (Romans 5:17–19)

The wages of sin is death, but Your gift, O God, is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 6:23)

Everything You have created, O God, eagerly waits in expectation of the time when Your children will appear in their full and final glory. (Romans 8:19)

You, O God, will have mercy on whom You have mercy, and You will have compassion on whom You have compassion. It does not

depend on human desire or effort, but on Your mercy. (Romans 9:15–16)

You, O Christ, died and returned to life, that You might be the Lord of both the dead and the living. (Romans 14:9)

Your foolishness, O God, is wiser than human wisdom, and Your weakness is stronger than human strength. But You chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise, and You chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong; the lowly things of this world and the despised things You have chosen, and the things that are not, to nullify the things that are, so that no one may boast before You. (1 Corinthians 1:25, 27–29)

No one can lay a foundation other than the one already laid; You are the foundation, O Jesus Christ. (1 Corinthians 3:11)

You, O Christ, our Passover lamb, have been sacrificed for us. (1 Corinthians 5:7)

You died for our sins, O Christ, according to the Scriptures; You were buried, and You were raised on the third day according to the Scriptures. (1 Corinthians 15:3–4)

We know Your grace, O Lord Jesus Christ, that though You were rich, yet for our sakes You became poor, that we, through Your poverty, might become rich. (2 Corinthians 8:9)

Thanks be to You, O God, for Your indescribable gift! (2 Corinthians 9:15)

Clearly no one is justified before You, O God, by the law, for "The righteous will live by faith." (Galatians 3:11)

When the fullness of time had come, You, O God, sent forth Your Son, born of a woman, born under law, to redeem those under law, that we might receive the adoption as sons. (Galatians 4:4–5)

Your power, O God, toward us who believe is power according to the working of Your mighty strength, which You exerted in Christ when You raised Him from the dead and seated Him at Your right hand in the heavenly realms, far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every title that can be given, not only in the present age but also in the one to come. (Ephesians 1:19–21)

God placed all things under Your feet, O Christ, and appointed You to be head over all things for the church, which is Your body, the fullness of You who fill all in all. (Ephesians 1:22–23)

You are able to do immeasurably more than all that we ask or think, O God, according to Your power that is at work within us. To You be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever. (Ephesians 3:20–21)

There is one body and one Spirit, just as we were called in one hope of our calling in You—one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all. You are over all and through all and in all. (Ephesians 4:4–6)

My attitude should be the same as Yours, Christ Jesus; though You are in Your very nature God, You did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but emptied Yourself, taking the nature of a servant and being made in human form. And appearing as a human being, You humbled Yourself and became obedient to death, even death on a cross. (Philippians 2:5–8)

Christ, You are the head of the body, the church; You are the beginning and the firstborn from among the dead, so that in everything You might have the supremacy. (Colossians 1:18)

O God, You were pleased to have all Your fullness dwell in Christ and through Him to reconcile all things to Yourself, whether things on earth or things in heaven, having made peace through the blood of His cross. (Colossians 1:19–20)

The mystery that has been kept hidden for ages and generations is now disclosed to the saints. You, Lord God, have chosen to make known among the Gentiles the glorious riches of this mystery, which is Christ in us, the hope of glory. (Colossians 1:26–27)

In You, O Christ, there is no Greek or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but You, O Christ, are all and in all. (Colossians 3:11)

You, O Lord, are one God, and there is only one Mediator between You and people, the Man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself as a ransom for all—the testimony given in its proper time. (1 Timothy 2:5–6)

God's grace was given to us in You, Christ Jesus, before the beginning of time and has now been revealed through Your appearing, O Savior; You abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. (2 Timothy 1:9–10)

The faith of Your chosen, O God, and the knowledge of the truth that leads to godliness, is faith and knowledge resting in the hope of eternal life. It is an eternal life that You promised before the beginning of time—and You do not lie. At the appointed time You manifested Your word through the preaching entrusted to the apostles by Your command, O God our Savior. (Titus 1:1–3)

How shall we escape if we ignore Your great salvation? This salvation, which was first announced by the Lord, was confirmed by those who heard Him. You, O God, also bore witness to it by signs and wonders and various miracles and gifts of the Holy Spirit distributed according to Your will. (Hebrews 2:3–4)

We see You, Jesus, the One who was made a little lower than the angels—now crowned with glory and honor because You suffered death, so that by the grace of God You might taste death for everyone. In bringing many of us to glory, it was fitting that God, for whom and through whom everything exists, should make You—

the author of our salvation—perfect through suffering. (Hebrews 2:9-10)

Since the children God has given You, Jesus, have bodies made of flesh and blood, You shared in their humanity so that by Your death You might destroy him who holds the power of death—that is, the devil—and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by their fear of death. (Hebrews 2:14–15)

We thank You, O Christ, that You were made like Your brothers and sisters in every way, in order that You might become a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God, to make propitiation for our sins. Because You Yourself suffered when You were tempted, You are able to help us who are being tempted. (Hebrews 2:17–18)

Because You live forever, Lord Jesus, You have a permanent priesthood. Therefore You are also able to save us completely—we who come to God through You, since You always live to intercede for us. (Hebrews 7:24–25)

You, O Christ, are the mediator of a new covenant, because You died as a ransom to set free those who are called from the transgressions committed under the first covenant, that they may receive the promise of the eternal inheritance. (Hebrews 9:15)

By the will of God, I have been sanctified through the offering of Your body, O Jesus Christ, once for all. And every priest stands daily ministering and offering again and again the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins. But when You had offered for all time one sacrifice for sins, You sat down at the right hand of God, waiting from that time for Your enemies to be made a footstool for Your feet. For by one offering, You have made perfect forever those who are being sanctified. (Hebrews 10:10–14)

I have come to Mount Zion, to the heavenly Jerusalem, Your city, O living God. I have come to myriad angels, and to the assembly and church of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven. I have come to

You, the Judge of all people, to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, to Jesus the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks of better things than the blood of Abel. (Hebrews 12:22–24)

Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from You, the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation, or shifting shadow. Of Your own will You brought us forth by the word of truth, that we might be a kind of firstfruits of Your creatures. (James 1:17–18)

As living stones, we are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to You, O God, through Jesus Christ. We are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for Your own possession, O God, that we may declare Your praises; You called us out of darkness into Your marvelous light. (1 Peter 2:5, 9)

O Christ, You suffered for me, leaving me an example that I should follow in Your steps. "He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth." When You were reviled, You did not retaliate; when You suffered, You made no threats, but entrusted Yourself to Him who judges righteously; and You Yourself bore my sins in Your body on the tree, so that I might die to sins and live for righteousness; by Your wounds I have been healed. For I was like a sheep going astray, but now I have returned to You, the Shepherd and Overseer of my soul. (1 Peter 2:21–25)

By this Your love, O God, was manifested to us, that You have sent Your only begotten Son into the world that we might live through Him. In this is love, not that we loved You, O God, but that You loved us and sent Your Son to be the propitiation for our sins. (1 John 4:9–10)

You, Father, have sent the Son to be the Savior of the world. If I confess that Jesus is Your Son, O God, You abide in me and I in You.

(1 John 4:14-15)

Jesus Christ, You are the faithful witness, the firstborn from the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth. To You—who love us and have freed us from our sins by Your blood and have made us to be a kingdom and priests to serve Your God and Father—be glory and power for ever and ever. (Revelation 1:5–6)

Lord, thank you for the invitation you extended to me when You said, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If you hear My voice and open the door, I will come in to you and dine with you, and you with Me. To you who overcome, I will give the right to sit with Me on My throne, just as I overcame and sat down with My Father on His throne." (Revelation 3:20–21)

Lamb of God, You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, because You were slain, and with Your blood You purchased us for God from every tribe and language and people and nation. You have made us to be a kingdom and priests to serve our God, and we will reign on the earth. (Revelation 5:9–10)

A great multitude, which no one could number, from all nations and tribes and peoples and languages will stand before the throne and before You, the Lamb, clothed with white robes with palm branches in their hands, and they will cry out with a loud voice, "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!" (Revelation 7:9–10)

Consummation

To us a child was born, to us a son was given, and the government is on Your shoulders. And You are called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the increase of Your government and peace there will be no end. You reign on the throne of David and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with

justice and righteousness from this time on and forever. Your zeal, O Lord of hosts, will accomplish this. (Isaiah 9:6–7)

Lord, we look forward to the day when Your kingdom will come in all its fullness: The wolf will dwell with the lamb, and the leopard will lie down with the goat, and the calf and the lion and the yearling together, and a little child will lead them. The cow will feed with the bear; their young will lie down together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox. The infant will play near the hole of the cobra, and the young child will put his hand into the viper's hole. They will neither harm nor destroy on all Your holy mountain, for the earth will be full of the knowledge of You, O Lord, as the waters cover the sea. (Isaiah 11:6–9)

You, O Lord of hosts, have planned it, to bring low the pride of all glory and to humble all who are renowned on the earth. (Isaiah 23:9)

You, Lord God, will swallow up death forever, and You will wipe away the tears from every face; You will remove the reproach of Your people from all the earth. For You, the Lord, have spoken. And it will be said in that day, "Behold, this is our God; we have waited for Him, and He will save us. This is the Lord; we have trusted in Him. Let us rejoice and be glad in His salvation." (Isaiah 25:8–9)

Behold, You will come with power, Lord God, and Your arm will rule for You. Behold, Your reward is with You, and Your recompense accompanies You. You will feed Your flock like a shepherd; You will gather the lambs in Your arms and carry them close to Your heart; You will gently lead those that have young. (Isaiah 40:10–11)

The heavens will vanish like smoke; the earth will wear out like a garment, and its inhabitants will die in the same way. But Your salvation, O Lord, will last forever, and Your righteousness will never fail. (Isaiah 51:6)

You will create a new heavens and a new earth, O Sovereign Lord. The former things will not be remembered, nor will they come to mind. (Isaiah 65:17)

The wolf and the lamb will feed together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox, and dust will be the serpent's food. They will neither harm nor destroy in all Your holy mountain. (Isaiah 65:25)

You, O Lord, will come with fire, and with Your chariots like a whirlwind; You will render Your anger with fury and Your rebuke with flames of fire. (Isaiah 66:15)

You, O God, are jealous and You, O Lord, avenge; You take vengeance and are filled with wrath. You take vengeance on Your adversaries, and You reserve wrath against Your enemies. You, O Lord, are slow to anger and great in power and will not leave the guilty unpunished. Your way is in the whirlwind and the storm, and clouds are the dust of Your feet. (Nahum 1:2–3)

The earth will be filled with the knowledge of Your glory, O Lord, as the waters cover the sea. (Habakkuk 2:14)

From the rising to the setting of the sun, Your name will be great among the nations. In every place incense and pure offerings will be brought to Your name, for Your name will be great among the nations. (Malachi 1:11)

Son of Man, You will come in the glory of Your Father with Your angels, and then You will reward everyone according to their works. (Matthew 16:27)

As the lightning comes from the east and flashes to the west, so will be Your coming, O Son of Man. Your sign will appear in the sky, and all the nations of the earth will mourn, and they will see You coming on the clouds of the sky with power and great glory. (Matthew 24:27, 30)

I must be ready, for You, Jesus, the Son of Man, will come at an hour when I do not expect You. (Matthew 24:44; Luke 12:40)

You, Jesus, will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give You the throne of Your father David, and You will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and Your kingdom will never end. (Luke 1:32–33)

If I am ashamed of You and Your words, Jesus, then You, O Son of Man, will be ashamed of me when You come in Your glory and in the glory of Your Father and of the holy angels. (Luke 9:26)

The children of this age marry and are given in marriage, but those who are considered worthy of taking part in that age and the resurrection from the dead will neither marry nor be given in marriage. They can no longer die, for they are like the angels and are Your children, O God, being children of the resurrection. (Luke 20:34–36)

An hour is coming, and now is, when the dead will hear Your voice, O Son of God, and those who hear will live. For as the Father has life in Himself, so He has granted You to have life in Yourself, and He has given You authority to execute judgment because You are the Son of Man. (John 5:25–27)

An hour is coming when all who are in the graves will hear Your voice, O Son of Man, and will come out—those who have done good will rise to a resurrection of life, and those who have done evil will rise to a resurrection of judgment. (John 5:28–29)

You, O God, will judge people's secret thoughts through Jesus Christ, according to the gospel. (Romans 2:16)

We will all stand before Your judgment seat, O Lord. For You have said, "As I live, every knee will bow before Me, and every tongue will confess to God." So then, each of us will give an account of himself to You. (Romans 14:10–12)

The first man was of the dust of the earth; You, Jesus Christ, the second Man, are from heaven. As was the earthly man, so are those who are of the earth; and as You, the Man from heaven are, so also are those who are of heaven. And just as we have borne the image of the earthly man, so shall we bear Your likeness—You who are the heavenly Man. (1 Corinthians 15:47–49)

We will not all sleep, but we will all be changed in a moment—in the twinkling of an eye—at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed. For this perishable must clothe itself with the imperishable, and this mortal with immortality. (1 Corinthians 15:51–53)

God highly exalted You, Christ Jesus, and gave You the name that is above every name, that at Your name, Jesus, every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that You are Lord, to the glory of God the Father. (Philippians 2:9–11)

We are not to be ignorant about those who fall asleep or grieve like other people, who have no hope. For if we believe that You, Jesus, died and rose again, even so the Father will bring with You those who have fallen asleep in You. According to Your own word, we who are alive and remain until Your coming will not precede those who have fallen asleep. For You Yourself will come down from heaven with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trumpet of God, and the dead in You will rise first. Then we who are alive and remain will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet You in the air. And so we will be with You forever. (1 Thessalonians 4:13–17)

We are looking for the blessed hope of Your glorious appearing, Christ Jesus, our great God and Savior. You gave Yourself for us to redeem us from all iniquity and to purify for Yourself a people for Your own possession, zealous for good works. (Titus 2:13–14)

Since Your day, O Lord, will come like a thief, I ought to conduct my life with holiness and godliness as I look forward to the coming of Your day. According to Your promise, I am looking for a new heaven and a new earth, in which righteousness dwell. Therefore, since I am looking for these things, I will be diligent to be found at peace with You—pure and blameless before You. (2 Peter 3:10–14)

Jesus Christ, You are coming with the clouds, and every eye will see You, even those who pierced You; and all the peoples of the earth will mourn because of You. Even so, Amen. (Revelation 1:7)

The kingdom of the world has become Your kingdom, O God, and of Your Christ, and You will reign for ever and ever. (Revelation 11:15)

Blessed are those who die in You, Lord, from now on. They will rest from their labor, for their works will follow them. (Revelation 14:13)

Like the roar of rushing waters and like loud peals of thunder, a great multitude will shout, "Hallelujah! For the Lord God Almighty reigns. Let us rejoice and be glad and give Him glory! For Your marriage, O Lamb, has come, and Your bride has made herself ready." Blessed are those who are invited to Your marriage supper, O Lamb. (Revelation 19:6–7, 9)

We praise You, O Jesus, our Messiah, for the vision we have from John: He saw heaven opened, and there before him was a white horse. You are its rider, called Faithful and True; and in righteousness You judge and make war. Your eyes are like a flame of fire, and on Your head are many crowns. The armies of heaven, riding on white horses and dressed in fine linen, white and clean, are following You. Out of Your mouth goes a sharp sword with which You will strike down the nations. Your Holy City, the new Jerusalem, O God, will come down out of heaven from You, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. and the End. Yes, You are coming quickly. Amen. Come, Lord Jesus. (Revelation $22:12-13,\ 20$)

May Your merciful kindness be my comfort, according to Your promise to Your servant. (Psalm 119:76)

You, O Lord, will judge Your people and have compassion on Your servants. (Psalm 135:14)

You have loved me with an everlasting love; You have drawn me with lovingkindness. (Jeremiah 31:3)

I believe that it is through Your grace, our Lord Jesus, that I am saved. (Acts 15:11)

I have been set apart for the gospel of God—I am among those who are called to belong to You, Jesus Christ. (Romans 1:1,6)

You have loved me, O God, and called me to be a saint; You, O God my Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ have given me grace and peace. (Romans 1:7)

Having been justified by faith, I have peace with You, O God, through the Lord Jesus Christ, through whom I have gained access by faith into this grace in which I stand; and I rejoice in the hope of Your glory. (Romans 5:1–2)

In You, O Christ, I have obtained an inheritance, having been predestined according to the plan of Him who works all things according to the counsel of His will, that I who have trusted in You should be to the praise of His glory. (Ephesians 1:11–12)

By grace I have been saved through faith, and this not of myself; it is Your gift, O God, and not of works, so that I cannot boast.

(Ephesians 2:8–9)

Your grace, O Lord Jesus Christ, is with my spirit. (Philippians 4:23)

There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear, because fear involves punishment, and those who fear have not been perfected in love. (1 John 4:16–18)

I have been called, having been loved by You, God the Father, and kept by Jesus Christ. (Jude 1)

God's Salvation and Forgiveness

Lord, You are close to the brokenhearted and save those who are crushed in spirit. (Psalm 34:18)

The salvation of the righteous comes from You, the Lord; You are their stronghold in time of trouble. You, O Lord, help them and deliver them; You deliver them from the wicked and save them, because they take refuge in You. (Psalm 37:39–40)

You lifted me out of the slimy pit, O God, out of the mud and mire; You set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand. You put a new song in my mouth, a hymn of praise to You, my God. Many will see and fear and put their trust in You, O Lord. (Psalm 40:2–3)

Your sacrifices, O God, are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, You will not despise. (Psalm 51:17)

Have mercy on me, O God, have mercy on me, for in You my soul takes refuge. I will take refuge in the shadow of Your wings until destruction passes by. I cry out to You, O God Most High, to You who fulfill Your purpose for me. (Psalm 57:1–2)

My soul silently waits for You alone, O God; my salvation comes from You. You alone are my rock and my salvation; You are my stronghold; I will never be shaken. (Psalm 62:1–2)

My mouth will tell of Your righteousness and of Your salvation all day long, though I know not its measure. I will come in Your strength, O Lord God; I will proclaim Your righteousness, Yours alone. Since my youth, O God, You have taught me, and to this day I declare Your wondrous deeds. (Psalm 71:15–17)

Surely Your salvation is near to those who fear You. (Psalm 85:9)

You, O God, will not always strive with us, nor will You harbor Your anger forever. You do not treat us as our sins deserve or repay us according to our iniquities. For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is Your love for us who fear You; as far as the east is from the west, so far have You removed our transgressions from us.

As a father has compassion on his children, so You, O Lord, have compassion on us. (Psalm 103:9–13)

I love You, Lord, because You have heard my voice and my supplications. Because You turned Your ear to me, I will call on You as long as I live. (Psalm 116:1–2)

You, O Lord, are my strength and my song; You have become my salvation. (Psalm 118:14)

There is not a righteous person on earth who continually does good and never sins. (Ecclesiastes 7:20)

Surely You are my salvation; I will trust and not be afraid. You, the Lord God, are my strength and my song, and You have become my salvation. (Isaiah 12:2)

Let the wicked forsake their ways and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to You, Lord, and You will have mercy on them, and to You, our God, for You will abundantly pardon. (Isaiah 55:7)

I will greatly rejoice in You, Lord; my soul will be joyful in You, my God. For You have clothed me with garments of salvation and arrayed me in a robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with ornaments, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. (Isaiah 61:10)

All of us have become like those who are unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags. We all shrivel up like leaves, and our iniquities, like the wind, sweep us away. But now, O Lord, You are our Father. We are the clay; You are the potter; we are all the work of Your hand. (Isaiah 64:6, 8)

Since I have been justified by Christ's blood, how much more shall I be saved from Your wrath, O God, through Him. For if, when I was Your enemy, I was reconciled to You through the death of Your Son, how much more, having been reconciled, shall I be saved through His life. And not only this, but I also rejoice in You through my Lord Jesus Christ, through whom I have now received reconciliation. (Romans 5:9–11)

Sin shall not be my master, because I am not under law, but under grace. I have been set free from sin and have become a slave of righteousness. (Romans 6:14, 18)

O Father, You have qualified me to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. For You have rescued me from the dominion of darkness and brought me into the kingdom of Your beloved Son, in whom I have redemption, the forgiveness of sins. (Colossians 1:12–14)

Once I was alienated from You, O God, and was an enemy in my mind because of my evil works. But now You have reconciled me, by Christ's fleshly body through death, to present me holy and blameless in Your sight and free from reproach. (Colossians 1:21–22)

God did not appoint me to suffer wrath but to obtain salvation through You, my Lord Jesus Christ. You died for me, so that, whether I am awake or asleep, I may live together with You. (1 Thessalonians 5:9–10)

From the beginning, God, You chose me for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. You called me to this through the gospel, that I might obtain the glory of my Lord Jesus Christ. (2 Thessalonians 2:13–14)

It is a trustworthy saying, that deserves full acceptance, that You, Christ Jesus, came into the world to save sinners. I obtained mercy as the worst of sinners, so that You, O Christ Jesus, might display Your unlimited patience as an example for those who would believe on You for eternal life. (1 Timothy 1:15–16)

God my Savior, when Your kindness and love appeared, You saved me, not by works of righteousness that I had done, but according to Your mercy. You saved me through the washing of regeneration and renewal by Your Holy Spirit, whom You poured out on me abundantly through Jesus Christ my Savior, so that having been justified by Your grace, I might become Your heir, having the hope of eternal life. (Titus 3:4–7)

If I claim to be without sin, I deceive myself, and the truth is not in me. If I confess my sins, You are faithful and just and will forgive me my sins and purify me from all unrighteousness. If I claim I have not sinned, I make You a liar and Your word is not in me. (1 John 1:8–10)

The secret things belong to You, Lord our God, but the things revealed belong to us and to our children forever, that we may observe Your words. (Deuteronomy 29:29)

O Lord, You Yourself go before me and will be with me; You will never leave me nor forsake me. I will not be afraid or be dismayed. (Deuteronomy 31:8)

O Lord, You are my rock and my fortress and my deliverer; O God, You are my rock; I will take refuge in You. You are my shield and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold and my refuge—my Savior; You save me from violence. I call on You, Lord; You are worthy of praise, and I am saved from my enemies. (2 Samuel 22:2–4)

O God, You are my strong fortress, and You set the blameless free in Your way. You make my feet like the feet of a deer; You enable me to stand on the heights. You train my hands for battle, so that my arms can bend a bow of bronze. You give me Your shield of victory; You stoop down to make me great. You broaden the path beneath me, and my feet have not slipped. (2 Samuel 22:33–37)

My heart rejoices in You, Lord; my horn is exalted in You, Lord. My mouth boasts over my enemies, for I delight in Your salvation. (1 Samuel 2:1)

I will give thanks to You, Lord, call upon Your name and make known to others what You have done. I will sing to You, sing praises to You, and tell of all Your wonderful acts. (1 Chronicles 16:8–9)

I glory in Your holy name, O Lord. Let the hearts of those who seek You rejoice. I will seek You, O Lord, and Your strength; I will seek Your face always. I will remember the wonderful works You have done, the miracles and the judgments You pronounced. (1 Chronicles 16:10–12)

I trust in Your loyal love; my heart rejoices in Your salvation. I will sing to You, O Lord, for You have dealt bountifully with me. (Psalm 13:5–6)

I will bless You, Lord, at all times; Your praise will always be in my mouth. (Psalm 34:1)

I will sing of Your strength, yes, I will sing of Your mercy in the morning, for You have been my stronghold, my refuge in times of trouble. To You, O my Strength, I will sing praises, for You are my fortress, my loving God. (Psalm 59:16–17)

Because Your lovingkindness is better than life, my lips will praise You. So I will bless You as long as I live; I will lift up my hands in Your name. (Psalm 63:3–4)

I will praise Your name in song, O God, and magnify You with thanksgiving. (Psalm 69:30)

My soul will bless You, Lord, and not forget all Your benefits. You forgive all my iniquities and heal all my diseases. You redeem my life from the pit and crown me with love and compassion. You satisfy my desires with good things, so that my youth is renewed like the eagles. (Psalm 103:2–5)

I will sing to You, Lord, as long as I live; I will sing praise to You, my God, while I have my being. May my meditation be pleasing to You; I will be glad in You, Lord. (Psalm 104:33–34)

My mouth will speak Your praise, O Lord, and every creature will bless Your holy name for ever and ever. (Psalm 145:21)

I will praise You, Lord, while I live; I will sing praises to You, my God, while I have my being. (Psalm 146:2)

I will exult in You, Lord; I will rejoice in You, O God of my salvation. You, Lord God, are my strength; You make my feet like the feet of a deer and enable me to go on the heights. (Habakkuk 3:18–19)

We should not get drunk on wine, for that is dissipation. Instead, we should be filled with the Spirit, speaking to one another with psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs; singing and making music in our hearts to You, always giving thanks to You, Father, for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. (Ephesians 5:18–20)

I will rejoice in You always, Lord. (Philippians 4:4)

God, I will rejoice always, pray without ceasing, and give thanks in all circumstances, for this is Your will for us in Christ Jesus. (1 Thessalonians 5:16–18)

Since I am receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, I will be thankful and so worship You acceptably, my God, with reverence and awe, for You are a consuming fire. (Hebrews 12:28–29)

I will fear You, God, and give You glory, because the hour of Your judgment has come. I will worship You who made the heavens and the earth, the sea and the springs of water. (Revelation 14:7)

Identity and Life in Christ

I am the salt of the earth, but if the salt loses its flavor, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. I am the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a lampstand, and it gives light to all who are in the house. In the same way, may I let my light shine

before all people, that they may see my good deeds and praise You, my Father in heaven. (Matthew 5:13–16)

Jesus, You have asked the Father, and He has given me another Comforter to be with me forever, even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him. But I know Him, for He lives in me. (John 14:16–17)

Lord Jesus, You are in Your Father, and I am in You, and You are in me. (John 14:20)

I died to sin; how can I live in it any longer? (Romans 6:2)

If I have been united with You, O Christ, in the likeness of Your death, I will certainly also be united with You in the likeness of Your resurrection. (Romans 6:5)

I know that my old self was crucified with You, O Christ, so that the body of sin might be done away with, that I should no longer be a slave to sin; for anyone who has died has been freed from sin. (Romans 6:6–7)

I have become dead to the law through Your body, O Christ, that I might belong to another, to You who were raised from the dead, in order that I might bear fruit to God. But now, by dying to what once bound me, I have been released from the law so that I serve in newness of the Spirit and not in the old way of the letter. (Romans 7:4, 6)

I delight in Your law, O God, in my inner being. (Romans 7:22)

There is now no condemnation for those who are in You, Christ Jesus, because the law of the Spirit of life in You has set us free from the law of sin and death. (Romans 8:1–2)

I am not in the flesh but in the Spirit, since the Spirit, O God, lives in me. And whoever does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to Him. (Romans 8:9)

If You, O Christ, are in me, my body is dead because of sin, yet my spirit is alive because of righteousness. And if the Spirit of Him who raised You, Jesus, from the dead is living in me, He who raised You, Christ, from the dead will also give life to my mortal body through His Spirit, who lives in me. (Romans 8:10–11)

I did not receive a spirit of slavery again to fear, but I received Your Spirit of adoption by whom I cry, "Abba, Father." The Spirit Himself testifies with my spirit that I am Your child, O God. (Romans 8:15–16)

We do not live for ourselves alone, nor do we die for ourselves alone. If we live, we live to You, Lord; and if we die, we die to You, Lord. So, whether we live or die, we belong to You, Lord. (Romans 14:7–8)

I have been sanctified in You, Christ Jesus, and called to be a saint, together with all those everywhere who call on Your name, O Lord Jesus Christ—their Lord and mine. (1 Corinthians 1:2)

It is because of You, O God, that I am in Christ Jesus, who has become for me wisdom from You—that is, my righteousness, sanctification and redemption. (1 Corinthians 1:30)

We are Your temple, O God, and Your Spirit lives in us. (1 Corinthians 3:16)

If we are joined to You, O Lord, we are one with You in spirit. (1 Corinthians 6:17)

You make me stand firm in Christ and You anointed me; You are God, who also sealed me and gave me the Spirit in my heart as a deposit. (2 Corinthians 1:21–22)

We are an epistle from Christ, written not with ink, but with You, O Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone, but on tablets of human hearts. (2 Corinthians 3:3)

I am not competent to claim anything for myself, but my competence comes from You, God. You have made me competent as a minister of a new covenant, not of the letter, but of the Spirit; for the letter kills, but the Spirit gives life. (2 Corinthians 3:5–6)

We all—with unveiled faces beholding Your glory, O Lord, as in a mirror—are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, which comes from You, Lord, who are the Spirit. (2 Corinthians 3:18)

You, God, who said "Let light shine out of darkness," made Your light shine in my heart to give me the light of the knowledge of Your glory, O God, in the face of Christ. But I have this treasure in an earthen vessel to show that this all-surpassing power is from You, God, and not from me. (2 Corinthians 4:6–7)

Those who are in You, O Christ, are new creations; the old things have passed away; behold, they have become new. (2 Corinthians 5:17)

You, O Christ, are not weak in dealing with us, but are powerful among us. For though You were crucified in weakness, yet You live by the power of God. For we are weak in You, yet by the power of God, we will live with You to serve others. (2 Corinthians 13:3–4)

We are all children of God through faith in You, Christ Jesus, for all of us who were baptized into You, Christ, have clothed ourselves with Christ. (Galatians 3:26–27)

Because I am a child, God, You have sent the Spirit of Your Son into my heart, crying, "Abba, Father." So I am no longer a slave, but a child; and if a child, then an heir through You, O God. (Galatians 4:6–7)

It is for freedom that You, O Christ, have set me free. I should stand firm, therefore, and not let myself be burdened again by a yoke of slavery. (Galatians 5:1)

May I never boast except in Your cross, our Lord Jesus Christ, through which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. (Galatians 6:14)

May You be blessed, O God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ—You who have blessed me with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly realms in Christ. (Ephesians 1:3)

I trusted in You, O Christ, when I heard the word of truth, the gospel of my salvation. Having believed, I was sealed in You with the Holy Spirit of promise, who is a deposit guaranteeing my inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of Your glory. (Ephesians 1:13–14)

You, O God, raised me up with Christ Jesus and seated me with You in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, in order that, in the coming ages, You might show the surpassing riches of Your grace in kindness toward me in Christ Jesus. (Ephesians 2:6–7)

I am Your workmanship, O God, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which You prepared beforehand for me to do. (Ephesians 2:10)

I do not want to grieve You, Holy Spirit of God, with whom I was sealed for the day of redemption. (Ephesians 4:30)

It has been granted to us on behalf of You, O Christ, not only to believe in You, but also to suffer for You. (Philippians 1:29)

Whatever was gain to me I now consider loss for Your sake, O Christ. What is more, I consider all things loss compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing You as my Lord; for Your sake I suffer the loss of all things and consider them rubbish, that I may

gain You and be found in You, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in You—the righteousness that comes from God on the basis of faith. (Philippians 3:7–9)

I want to know You, O Christ, and the power of Your resurrection and the fellowship of Your sufferings, being conformed to Your death, that I may attain to the resurrection from the dead. (Philippians 3:10–11)

I have been made complete in You, Christ, who are the head over all rule and authority. (Colossians 2:10)

Since I have been raised with You, O Christ, I should seek the things above, where You are seated at the right hand of God. I will set my mind on the things above, not on the things on the earth, for I died, and my life is now hidden with You in God. When You who are my life appear, then I also will appear with You in glory. (Colossians 3:1–4)

I have put off the old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in full knowledge according to the image of You, my Creator. (Colossians 3:9–10)

I have been chosen according to Your foreknowledge, O God my Father, in sanctification of the Spirit for obedience to Jesus Christ and sprinkling of His blood; grace and peace are mine in abundance. (1 Peter 1:2)

How great is the love You, O Father, have lavished on me, that I should be called Your child, O God—and I am! Therefore the world does not know me, because it did not know You. (1 John 3:1)

I am from You, O God, and I am one who overcomes, because You who are in me are greater than he who is in the world. (1 John 4:4)

O God, You have given me eternal life, and this life is in Your Son. Those who have Your Son have life; those who do not have Your Son, O God, do not have life. Since I believe in the name of Your Son, O God, I know that I have eternal life. (1 John 5:11–13)

Faith, Trust and Dependence

I will not depend on human strength but on You, Lord my God, for help and deliverance. (2 Chronicles 16:7–8, 12)

In the morning, O Lord, You will hear my voice; in the morning I will set my prayers before You and I will look to You. (Psalm 5:3)

Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but I will remember Your name, O Lord my God. (Psalm 20:7)

O Lord, You are my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? You are the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid? (Psalm 27:1)

O Lord, You are my strength and my shield; my heart trusts in You, and I am helped. My heart greatly rejoices, and I will give thanks to You in song. (Psalm 28:7)

I have tasted and seen that You, O Lord, are good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in You! (Psalm 34:8)

I will trust in You, Lord, and do good; I will dwell in the land and feed on Your faithfulness. I will delight myself in You, Lord, and You will give me the desires of my heart. I will commit my way to You, Lord, and trust in You, and You will bring it to pass. I will rest in You, Lord, and wait patiently for You; I will not fret because of those who prosper in their way, with those who practice evil schemes. (Psalm 37:3–5, 7)

Lord, all my longings are before You, and my sighing is not hidden from You. (Psalm 38:9)

Blessed are those who make You their trust, O Lord, who do not look to the proud or those who turn aside to lies. (Psalm 40:4)

I will cast my burden on You, O Lord, and You will sustain me; You will never allow the righteous to be shaken. (Psalm 55:22)

You preserve my life, and I am devoted to You. You are my God; You will save Your servant who trusts in You. (Psalm 86:2)

Those who dwell in Your shelter, O Most High, will rest in the shadow of the Almighty. I will say of You, Lord, "He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust." (Psalm 91:1–2)

I will seek You, Lord, and Your strength; I will seek Your face continually. I will remember the wonders You have done, Your miracles, and the judgments of Your mouth. (Psalm 105:4–5)

Though I walk in the midst of trouble, You will revive me; You will stretch out Your hand against the anger of my foes, and Your right hand will save me. O Lord, You will perfect Your work in me; Your mercy, O Lord, endures forever; You will not abandon the works of Your hands. (Psalm 138:7–8)

My eyes are upon You, O God the Lord; in You I take refuge; You will not leave my soul destitute. (Psalm 141:8)

You are my loving kindness and my fortress, my high tower and my deliverer, my shield, in whom I take refuge. (Psalm 144:2)

I will trust in You, Lord, with all my heart and lean not on my own understanding; in all my ways I will acknowledge You, and You will make my paths straight. I will not be wise in my own eyes, but I will fear You, Lord, and depart from evil. (Proverbs 3:5–7)

Your every word, O God, is tested; You are a shield to those who take refuge in You. (Proverbs 30:5)

You will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are stayed on You, because they trust in You. (Isaiah 26:3)

Because You, Lord God, help me, I will not be disgraced. Therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know I will not be put to shame. You who vindicate me are near; who will contend with me? Surely, Lord God, You will help me; who will condemn me? (Isaiah 50:7–9)

O Lord, the hope of Israel, all who forsake You will be put to shame. Those who depart from You will be written in the dust because they have forsaken You, Lord, the fountain of living water. (Jeremiah 17:13)

Not by might nor by power, but by Your Spirit, O Lord God of hosts. (Zechariah 4:6)

I shall not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from Your mouth, O God. (Matthew 4:4)

I look to You for my daily bread, O Father. Forgive me my debts as I also have forgiven my debtors, and lead me not into temptation, but deliver me from the evil one. For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. (Matthew 6:11–13)

When I ask, it will be given to me; when I seek, I will find; when I knock, the door will be opened to me. For those who ask receive; those who seek find; and for those who knock, the door will be opened. (Matthew 7:7–8; Luke 11:9–10)

Lord Jesus, You have said that unless I change and become like a little child, I will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, those who humble themselves and become like children are the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. (Matthew 18:3–4)

You have said, "Whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it and it will be yours." (Mark 11:24)

I will believe Your words, which will come true at their proper time. (Luke 1:20)

I am Your servant, O Lord; may Your will be done in me according to Your word. (Luke 1:38)

Those who believe in You, God's Son, are not condemned, but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in Your name—You who are the only begotten Son of God. (John 3:18)

The hour is coming and now is, when true worshipers will worship You, Father, in spirit and truth, for You, Father, are seeking such to worship You. You, O God, are spirit, and those who worship You must worship in spirit and truth. (John 4:23–24)

Jesus, you are the bread of God; You came down from heaven and gave life to the world. You are the bread of life. Those who come to You will never hunger, and those who believe in You will never thirst. (John 6:33, 35)

I believe in You, O Son of God; I have everlasting life. (John 6:47)

Unless I eat Your flesh, O Son of Man, and drink Your blood, I have no life in me. Those who eat Your flesh and drink Your blood have eternal life, and You will raise them up at the last day. For Your flesh is true food, and Your blood is true drink. Those who eat Your flesh and drink Your blood abide in You and You in them. As the living Father sent You, and You live because of the Father, so those who feed on You will live because of You. (John 6:53–57)

Lord Jesus, I have nowhere else to go; You have the words of eternal life. I believe and know that You are the Holy One of God. (John 6:68–69)

Those who believe in You, as the Scripture has said, will have rivers of living water flowing from within them, because Your Spirit

dwells in them. (John 7:38-39)

You are the light of the world, O Lord. Those who follow You will not walk in the darkness but will have the light of life. (John 8:12)

I will believe the light while I have it, so that I may become a child of light. (John 12:36)

Lord Jesus, if I believe in You, I do not believe in You only, but in the One who sent You. And I behold You; therefore I behold the One who sent You. (John 12:44–45)

I will not let my heart be troubled. I will trust in You, Father, and also in Christ. (John 14:1)

Peace You leave with me; Your peace You give to me. You do not give to me as the world gives. I will not let my heart be troubled nor let it be fearful. (John 14:27)

You are the vine; I am a branch; if I abide in You, and You in me, I will bear much fruit; for apart from You, I can do nothing. (John 15:5)

If I abide in You, and Your words abide in me, I can ask whatever I wish, and it will be done for me. As I ask in Your name, I will receive, that my joy may be full. (John 15:7, 16:24)

It is in You, Lord Jesus, that I have peace. In this world I will have tribulation, but I will be of good cheer, because You have overcome the world. (John 16:33)

Jesus, I believe that You are the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing I have life in Your name. (John 20:31)

I want to continue in Your grace, O God. (Acts 13:43)

Those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh; but those who live according to You, Holy Spirit, set their minds on the things that You, O Spirit, desire. The mind of the flesh is death, but Your mind, O Spirit, is life and peace. (Romans 8:5–6)

If I live according to the flesh, I will die; but if by You, Holy Spirit, I put to death the deeds of the body, I will live. For those who are led by You, the Spirit of God, are children of God. (Romans 8:13–14)

If I confess You with my mouth, Lord Jesus, and believe in my heart that God raised You from the dead, I will be saved. For it is with my heart that I believe unto righteousness, and it is with my mouth that I confess unto salvation. As the Scripture says, "Whoever trusts in Him will not be put to shame." (Romans 10:9–11)

I will not think of myself more highly than I ought to think, but I will think soberly, in accordance with the measure of faith You, O God, have given me. (Romans 12:3)

Your grace is sufficient for me, for Your power is made perfect in weakness. Therefore I will boast all the more gladly in my weaknesses, that Your power, O Christ, may rest upon me. Therefore I can be content in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions and in difficulties, for Your sake. For when I am weak, then I am strong. (2 Corinthians 12:9–10)

As I walk in You, O Spirit, I will not fulfill the desires of the flesh. For the flesh desires what is contrary to You, O Spirit, and You what is contrary to the flesh; for You oppose each other, so that I may not do the things that I wish. The works of the flesh are evident: immorality, impurity, sensuality, idolatry, sorcery, hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissension, factions, envy, drunkenness, revelry and the like. Those who practice such things will not inherit Your

kingdom, O God. But the fruit of Your Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control; against such things there is no law. (Galatians 5:19–23)

Since I live in You, O Holy Spirit, I will also walk in You. (Galatians 5:25)

In You, Christ Jesus my Lord, I have boldness and confident access to God through faith in You. (Ephesians 3:12)

You, O God, will supply all my needs according to Your glorious riches in Christ Jesus. To You, my God and Father, be glory for ever and ever. (Philippians 4:19–20)

Just as I received You, Christ Jesus the Lord, so I will walk in You, rooted and built up in You, and established in the faith, as I was taught, and abounding in thanksgiving. (Colossians 2:6–7)

I am not ashamed, because I know whom I have believed and am convinced that You are able to guard what I have entrusted to You until that day. (2 Timothy 1:12)

This is a trustworthy saying: If we died with You, we will also live with You; if we endure, we will also reign with You. If we deny You, You will also deny us; if we are faithless, You will remain faithful, for You cannot deny Yourself. (2 Timothy 2:11–13)

I will draw near to You, O God, with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having my heart sprinkled to cleanse me from an evil conscience and my body washed with pure water. (Hebrews 10:22)

Without faith it is impossible to please You, O God, for those who come to You must believe that You exist, and that You reward those who earnestly seek You. (Hebrews 11:6)

I can say with confidence, "The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can people do to me?" (Hebrews 13:6)

Through faith I am guarded by Your power, O God, for salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time. (1 Peter 1:5)

You, O Christ, were chosen before the creation of the world but were revealed in these last times for our sake. Through You I believe in God, who raised You from the dead and glorified You, so that my faith and hope are in God. (1 Peter 1:20–21)

Everyone who believes, Jesus, that You are the Christ is born of God, and everyone who loves the Father loves You who are begotten of Him. Whoever is born of God overcomes the world, and this is the victory that has overcome the world—our faith. Who is the one who overcomes the world? The one who believes that You, Jesus, are the Son of God. (1 John 5:1, 4–5)

This is the confidence I have in You, O Son of God, that if I ask anything according to Your will, You hear me. And if I know that You hear me, whatever I ask, I know that I have the requests that I have asked from You. (1 John 5:14–15)

Faithfulness, Commitment and Submission

You are God Almighty; I want to walk before You and be blameless. (Genesis 17:1)

I shall have no other gods before You. (Exodus 20:3; Deuteronomy 5:7)

I shall not make for myself an idol in any form. (Exodus 20:4; Deuteronomy 5:8)

I shall not take Your name, O Lord my God, in vain, for You, Lord, will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses Your name. (Exodus

20:7; Deuteronomy 5:11)

I shall not revile You, O God, or curse the ruler of my people. (Exodus 22:28)

I will not spread false reports, nor will I help a wicked person by being a malicious witness. (Exodus 23:1)

I shall dedicate the best of the firstfruits of Your provision, O God, to You, Lord my God. (Exodus 23:19)

You are the Lord my God; I will consecrate myself and be holy, because You are holy. You are the Lord who brought Your people up out of Egypt to be their God; therefore I will be holy, because You are holy. (Leviticus 11:44–45; 19:2)

I shall not swear falsely by Your name and so profane Your name, O my God; You are the Lord. (Leviticus 19:12)

I shall consecrate myself and be holy, because You are the Lord my God. I shall keep Your statutes and practice them; You are the Lord who sanctifies me. (Leviticus 20:7–8)

I shall be holy to You, for You the Lord are holy, and You have set me apart to be Your own. (Leviticus 20:26)

As for me and my household, we will serve You, O Lord. (Joshua 24:15)

I will not turn aside from following You, Lord, but I will serve You, O Lord, with all my heart. (1 Samuel 12:20b)

I will not turn my heart away from You, the Lord, the God of Israel, but I will keep what You, Lord, have commanded. (1 Kings 11:9–10)

I will not forget the covenant You have made with me, nor will I worship other gods. But I will fear You, Lord my God; it is You who

will deliver me from the hand of all my enemies. (2 Kings 17:38–39)

I shall act in the fear of You, O Lord, faithfully and with a loyal heart. (2 Chronicles 19:9)

Though You slay me, yet will I hope in You, O God. (Job 13:15)

I will not forget You, God of my salvation; I will remember You, the Rock of my refuge. (Isaiah 17:10)

By Your grace I will not forsake You, the fountain of living waters, to dig my own cisterns, broken cisterns that can hold no water. (Jeremiah 2:13)

I will return to You, my God, maintain mercy and justice, and wait on You, my God, continually. (Hosea 12:6)

I shall worship You, O Lord my God, and serve You only. (Matthew 4:10)

If I wish to come after You, Jesus Christ, I must deny myself and take up my cross and follow You. For if I want to save my life, I will lose it, but if I lose my life for You and for the gospel, I will find it. For what profit will I have if I gain the whole world, yet forfeit my soul? Or what will I give in exchange for my soul? (Matthew 16:24–26; Mark 8:34–37; Luke 9:23–25)

The greatest among us should be like the youngest, and the one who rules like the one who serves. For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one who is at the table? But You, Jesus, came among us as the One who serves. (Luke 22:26–27)

You must increase, O Christ; I must decrease. (John 3:30)

Like Jesus, my food is to do the will of You who sent me and to accomplish Your work. (John 4:34)

If I serve You, Jesus, I must follow You; and where You are, Your servant also will be. If I serve You, the Father will honor me. (John 12:26)

I am not of the world, even as You, Jesus, are not of the world. (John 17:16)

I want Your name, Lord Jesus, to be magnified in my life. (Acts 19:17)

I do not consider my life dear to me, if only I may finish my course and the ministry which I received from You, Lord Jesus—to testify to the gospel of the grace of God. (Acts 20:24)

I am committed to You, O God, and to the word of Your grace, which is able to build me up and give me an inheritance among all those who are sanctified. (Acts 20:32)

In view of Your mercy, O God, I present my body as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to You, which is my reasonable service. (Romans 12:1)

As Your servant, O Christ, and a steward of Your possessions, may I be found faithful. (1 Corinthians 4:1–2)

My body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in me, whom I have from You, O God, and I am not my own. For I was bought at a price; therefore I will glorify You, O God, in my body. (1 Corinthians 6:19–20)

I will be strong in You, Lord, and in Your mighty power. I will put on Your full armor, O God, so that I will be able to stand against the schemes of the devil. My struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the world rulers of this darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms. Therefore, I will put on Your full armor, O God, so that I may be able to resist in the day of evil, and having done all, to stand. (Ephesians 6:10–13)

I will stand firm, girding my waist with truth, putting on the breastplate of righteousness, and fitting my feet with the readiness of the gospel of peace; above all, I take up the shield of faith with which I will be able to quench all the fiery darts of the evil one. I will take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is Your word, O God. With all prayer and petition, I will pray always in the Spirit, and to this end I will be watchful with all perseverance and petition for all the saints. (Ephesians 6:14–18)

As an obedient child, I will not conform myself to the former lusts I had when I lived in ignorance, but as You who called me are holy, so I will be holy in all my conduct, because it is written: "You shall be holy, for I am holy." (1 Peter 1:14–16)

Responsiveness and Obedience

I want to listen carefully to Your voice, O Lord my God, and do what is right in Your sight; I want to pay attention to Your commandments and keep all Your statutes. (Exodus 15:26)

By Your grace, I want to observe Your judgments and keep Your statutes, to walk in them; You are the Lord my God. I will keep Your statutes and Your judgments, by which I may live if I do them; You are the Lord. (Leviticus 18:4–5)

I will observe all Your statutes and all Your judgments and follow them; You are the Lord. (Leviticus 19:37)

I will keep Your commandments, O Lord my God, to walk in Your ways and to fear You. I will follow You, Lord my God, and fear You; I will keep Your commandments, hear Your voice, serve You and hold fast to You. (Deuteronomy 8:6; 13:4)

You will honor those who honor You, but those who despise You will be disdained. (1 Samuel 2:30)

Like Asa, I want to do what is good and right in Your sight, O Lord my God. (2 Chronicles 14:2)

I do not want to transgress Your commandments, O Lord, for I cannot prosper in disobedience. I will not forsake You, the Lord. (2 Chronicles 24:20)

In my distress I will seek Your favor, O Lord my God, and humble myself greatly before You, the God of my fathers, for I know that You, O Lord, are God. (2 Chronicles 33:12–13)

Like Josiah, I want a tender and responsive heart, so that I will humble myself before You when I hear Your word. (2 Chronicles 34:27)

I will serve You, Lord, with fear and rejoice with trembling. (Psalm 2:11)

Blessed are those whose ways are blameless, who walk in Your law, O Lord. Blessed are those who keep Your testimonies and seek You with all their heart. (Psalm 119:1–2)

I will incline my ear and come to You; I will hear You, that my soul may live. (Isaiah 55:3)

Everyone who hears Your words, Lord Jesus, and does them is like a wise man who built his house on the rock. (Matthew 7:24)

I want to be righteous before You, O God, walking blamelessly in all Your commandments and ordinances, O Lord. (Luke 1:6)

I desire not only to call You "Lord" but to do what You say. By Your grace I will come to You, hear Your words and put them into practice. Then I will be like one who built a house, who dug down deep and laid the foundation on rock, and when a flood came, the torrent struck that house but could not shake it, because it was well built. (Luke 6:46–48)

When I have done all the things which are commanded me, I should realize that I am an unworthy servant; I have only done what I ought to have done. (Luke 17:10)

I must do the work of You who sent me while it is day; night is coming, when no one can work. (John 9:4)

If I love You, I will keep Your word; and Your Father will love me, and You and Your Father will come to me and make Your home with me. (John 14:23)

By this is Your Father glorified, Lord Jesus: that I bear much fruit, showing myself to be Your disciple. (John 15:8)

Just as I presented the members of my body as slaves to impurity and to ever-increasing lawlessness, so I now present my members as slaves to righteousness, leading to holiness. (Romans 6:19)

Hope and Reward

You are my shield, my very great reward. (Genesis 15:1)

I know, O my Redeemer, that You live and that in the end You will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see You, O God; I myself will see You and behold You with my own eyes and not another. How my heart yearns within me! (Job 19:25–27)

As for me, I will see Your face in righteousness; when I awake, I will be satisfied with Your likeness. (Psalm 17:15)

No one who waits for You will be ashamed, but those who are treacherous without cause will be ashamed. Show me Your ways, O Lord, teach me Your paths; lead me in Your truth and teach me, for You are the God of my salvation, and my hope is in You all day long. (Psalm 25:3–5)

I am confident that I will see Your goodness, O Lord, in the land of the living. I will hope in You and be of good courage, and You will strengthen my heart. Yes, I will hope in You, Lord. (Psalm 27:13–14)

I will sing praises to You, O Lord, and give thanks at the remembrance of Your holy name. For Your anger lasts only a moment, but Your favor is for a lifetime; weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning. (Psalm 30:4–5)

You are my hope, O Lord God; You are my trust from my youth. As for me, I will always have hope; I will praise You more and more. (Psalm 71:5, 14)

You, O Lord, take pleasure in those who fear You, who put their hope in Your unfailing love. (Psalm 147:11)

You have plans for me, O Lord; You have declared that you have plans to prosper me and not to harm me, plans to give me a future and a hope. (Jeremiah 29:11)

I will watch in hope for You, O Lord; I will wait for You, O God of my salvation; You, my God, will hear me. (Micah 7:7)

Blessed are those who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are we when people insult us, persecute us, and falsely say all kinds of evil against us because of You. We will rejoice and be glad, because great is our reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before us. (Matthew 5:10–12)

There is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields for Your sake and the gospel's, O God, who will not receive a hundred times as much in this present age—houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and fields, along with persecutions—and in the age to come, eternal life. (Mark 10:29–30)

I have hope in You, O God, that there will be a resurrection of both the righteous and the wicked. In view of this, I strive always to keep my conscience blameless before You and before people. (Acts 24:15–16)

I rejoice in my tribulations, knowing that tribulation produces perseverance; and perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not disappoint, because Your love, O God, has been poured out into my heart through the Holy Spirit whom You have given to me. (Romans 5:3–5)

Since I am Your child, O God, I am Your heir, and a joint heir with Christ, if indeed I share in His sufferings in order that I may also share in His glory. For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed to me. (Romans 8:17–18)

Having the firstfruits of Your Spirit, O Lord, I groan inwardly as I wait eagerly for my adoption, the redemption of my body. For in hope I have been saved, but hope that I can see is not hope; for who

hopes for what is already there? But if I hope for what I do not yet have, I eagerly wait for it with patience. (Romans 8:23–25)

Whatever things were written in the past were written for our learning, so that through endurance and the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope. (Romans 15:4)

God of hope, You will fill me with all joy and peace as I trust in You, so that I may overflow with hope by the power of Your Holy Spirit. (Romans 15:13)

I will judge nothing before the time when You come O Lord,; You will bring to light what is hidden in darkness and will expose the motives of people's hearts; and then each one will receive praise from God. (1 Corinthians 4:5)

Now I see dimly, as in a mirror, but then I shall see face to face. Now I know in part, but then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known. (1 Corinthians 13:12)

Since You, O God, have made me adequate as a minister of the new covenant, I do not lose heart. (2 Corinthians 3:6,4:1)

I will not lose heart; even though my outward self is perishing, yet my inner self is being renewed day by day. For this light affliction, which is momentary, is working for me a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory. So I do not look at the things that are seen but at the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are temporary, but the things that are unseen are eternal. (2 Corinthians 4:16–18)

Lord, I make it my ambition to please You whether I am at home in the body or away from it. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, that we all may receive what is due us for the things done while in the body, whether good or bad. (2 Corinthians 5:9–10)

I have not been made perfect, but I press on to lay hold of that for which You, O Christ Jesus, also laid hold of me. I do not consider myself yet to have attained it, but one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and stretching forward to what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize of the upward call of God in You, Christ Jesus. (Philippians 3:12–14)

My citizenship is in heaven; from there I also eagerly await You, my Savior, Lord Jesus Christ. You will transform my lowly body and conform it to Your glorious body by the power that enables You to subject all things to Yourself. (Philippians 3:20–21)

My faith in You, Christ Jesus, and my love for all the saints spring from the hope that is stored up for me in heaven and that I have heard about in the word of truth, the gospel. (Colossians 1:4–5)

I desire that You Yourself, O God of peace, will sanctify me completely, and that my whole spirit, soul and body will be preserved blameless at the coming of my Lord Jesus Christ. You who call me are faithful; You also will do it. (1 Thessalonians 5:23–24)

Those who are rich in this present world should not be arrogant or set their hope on the uncertainty of riches but on You, O God, who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They should do good, be rich in good works, and be generous and willing to share. In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the future, so that they may lay hold of true life. (1 Timothy 6:17–19)

You, O Lord, will deliver me from every evil work and will bring me safely to Your heavenly kingdom. To You be glory forever and ever. (2 Timothy 4:18)

My hope in You, O God, is an anchor for my soul, both sure and steadfast, and it enters the inner sanctuary behind the veil, where Jesus the forerunner has entered on my behalf, having become a high priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek. (Hebrews 6:19-20)

By Your grace, O God, I want to live to the end in faith, knowing that I will not receive the promises on earth, but see them and welcome them from a distance; I confess that I am a stranger and a pilgrim on the earth. Instead, I long for a better country, a heavenly one. In this way, You, O God, will not be ashamed to be called my God, for You have prepared a city for me. Like Moses, I esteem reproach for the sake of Christ as of greater value than the treasures of this world, because I am looking to the reward. (Hebrews 11:13, 16, 26)

May You be blessed, O God and Father of my Lord Jesus Christ. According to Your great mercy, You have given me new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that is incorruptible and undefiled and unfading, reserved in heaven for me. (1 Peter 1:3–4)

Now I am Your child, O God, and what I shall be has not yet been revealed. I know that when You are revealed, I shall be like You, for I shall see You as You are. And those who have this hope in You purify themselves, just as You are pure. (1 John 3:2–3)

You, O God, are able to keep me from falling and to present me before Your glorious presence faultless and with great joy. (Jude 24)

THE CHARACTER I WANT TO CULTIVATE

Godliness and Reverence

Like Noah, I want to be a righteous person, blameless among the people of my time, and one who walks with You, O God. (Genesis 6:9)

I will be careful not to forget You, O Lord my God, by failing to observe Your commandments, Your ordinances and Your statutes. (Deuteronomy 8:11)

O Lord, You reward each person for righteousness and faithfulness. (1 Samuel 26:23)

You, the God of Israel, spoke; You, the Rock of Israel said to me: "Those who rule over others in righteousness, who rule in the fear of God, are like the light of morning when the sun rises, a morning without clouds, like the tender grass springing out of the earth through the sunshine after rain." (2 Samuel 23:3–4)

Like Hezekiah, I want to do what is good and right and true before You, Lord my God, by seeking You with all my heart. (2 Chronicles 31:20–21)

You know the way that I take; when You have tested me, I shall come forth as gold. My feet have held fast to Your steps; I have kept to Your way without turning aside. (Job 23:10–11)

I know that You, O Lord, have set apart the godly for Yourself; You, O Lord, hear when I call to You. (Psalm 4:3)

Who may ascend Your hill, O Lord? Who may stand in Your holy place? Those who have clean hands and pure hearts, who have not lifted up their souls to idols or sworn by what is false. (Psalm 24:3–4)

I will teach my children to fear You, O Lord: Who are they who love life and desire many days that they may see good? They are to keep their tongues from evil and their lips from speaking guile; they are to depart from evil and do good, to seek peace and pursue it. Your eyes, O Lord, are on the righteous, and Your ears are attentive to their cry. (Psalm 34:11–15)

I will not be like those who do not make You their strength, O God, but trust in the abundance of their wealth and strengthen themselves in evil desires. (Psalm 52:7)

I will be careful to lead a blameless life. I will walk in the integrity of my heart in the midst of my house. I will set no wicked thing before my eyes. I hate the work of those who fall away; it will not cling to me. A perverse heart shall depart from me; I will not know evil. Those who slander a neighbor in secret, I will silence; I will not endure those who have haughty eyes and proud hearts. My eyes will be on the faithful in the land, that they may dwell with me; the one whose walk is blameless will minister to me. No one who practices deceit will dwell in my house; no one who speaks falsely will stand in my presence. (Psalm 101:2–7)

I have sought You with my whole heart; do not let me stray from Your commands. (Psalm 119:10)

Trouble and anguish have come upon me, but Your commands are my delight. (Psalm 119:143)

I rejoice at Your word as one who finds great spoil. I hate and abhor falsehood, but I love Your law. Great peace have they who love Your law, and nothing causes them to stumble. O Lord, I hope for Your salvation, and I follow Your commands. My soul keeps Your

testimonies, for I love them greatly. I keep Your precepts and Your testimonies, for all my ways are known to You. (Psalm 119:162–163, 165–168)

Unless You, O Lord, build the house, its builders labor in vain. Unless You, O Lord, guard the city, the watchmen stay awake in vain. (Psalm 127:1)

Surely the righteous will give thanks to Your name; the upright will dwell in Your presence. (Psalm 140:13)

I will honor You, Lord, with my wealth and with the firstfruits of all my increase. (Proverbs 3:9)

My ways are before Your eyes, O Lord, and You examine all my paths. (Proverbs 5:21)

Righteousness exalts a nation, but sin is a disgrace to any people. (Proverbs 14:34)

O Lord, You are far from the wicked, but You hear the prayer of the righteous. (Proverbs 15:29)

All my ways are pure in my own eyes, but You, O Lord, weigh my motives. (Proverbs 16:2)

I will commit my works to You, O Lord, and my plans will be established. (Proverbs 16:3)

Your name, O Lord, is a strong tower; the righteous run to it and are safe. (Proverbs 18:10)

Blessed are those who always fear You, O God, but those who harden their hearts fall into trouble. (Proverbs 28:14)

If I am afraid of people, fear will trap me. But if I trust in You, O Lord, You will keep me safe. (Proverbs 29:25)

I will fear You, O God, and keep Your commandments, for this applies to every person. (Ecclesiastes 12:13)

Who among us fears You, Lord, and obeys the word of Your Servant? Let those who walk in darkness and have no light trust in Your name, O Lord, and rely upon You, their God. (Isaiah 50:10)

As one who knows righteousness, who has Your law in my heart, I will not fear the reproach of others or be terrified when they revile me. (Isaiah 51:7)

I know and see that it is evil and bitter to forsake You, Lord my God, and to have no fear of You. (Jeremiah 2:19)

Cursed is the one who trusts in people, who depends on human strength and whose heart turns away from You, O Lord. But blessed is the one who trusts in You, whose confidence is in You. (Jeremiah 17:5, 7)

I want to let justice roll down like a river, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream. (Amos 5:24)

You have shown me what is good, O Lord; and what do You require of me but to act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with You, my God? (Micah 6:8)

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied. (Matthew 5:6)

I will take heed not to practice my righteousness before others to be seen by them. Otherwise, I will have no reward from You, my Father in heaven. (Matthew 6:1)

I will not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul, but rather, I will fear You, the One who is able to destroy both soul and body in hell. (Matthew 10:28)

I will not seek to justify myself in other people's eyes; You, O God, know my heart, and what is highly esteemed among people is detestable in Your sight. (Luke 16:15)

I will not love praise from people more than praise from You, O God. (John 12:43)

Like Barnabas, I want to be a good person, filled with You, O Holy Spirit, and with faith. (Acts 11:24)

I will not be lacking in zeal, but I will stay fervent in spirit, serving You, O Lord. (Romans 12:11)

The hour has come for me to wake up from sleep, for my salvation is nearer now than when I first believed. The night is nearly over; the day is almost here. Therefore I will cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light. (Romans 13:11–12)

Your kingdom, O God, is not a matter of eating and drinking, but of righteousness and peace and joy in Your Holy Spirit. (Romans 14:17)

Whatever I do, I should do all to Your glory, O God. (1 Corinthians 10:31)

I want my conscience to testify that I have conducted myself in the world in the holiness and sincerity that are from You, not in fleshly wisdom but in Your grace, O God, especially in my relationships with others. (2 Corinthians 1:12)

Since I have Your promises, O God, I will cleanse myself from all pollution of body and spirit, perfecting holiness out of reverence for You. (2 Corinthians 7:1)

I am not trying to win the approval of other people; I want to win Your approval, O God. If I were still trying to please people, I would not be a servant of Christ. (Galatians 1:10)

You, O God, are not mocked, for whatever we sow, this we will also reap. The one who sows to please the flesh will reap corruption; the one who sows to please the Spirit will, from the Spirit, reap eternal life. (Galatians 6:7–8)

I will conduct myself in a manner worthy of Your gospel, O Christ, standing firm in one spirit with other believers, with one mind striving together for the faith of the gospel. (Philippians 1:27)

I will work out my salvation with fear and trembling, for it is You, O God, who work in me to will and to act according to Your good purpose. (Philippians 2:12–13)

I will seek Your interests, Christ Jesus, and not my own. (Philippians 2:21)

Whatever I do, whether in word or in deed, I will do all in Your name, Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through You. (Colossians 3:17)

As I have been instructed how I ought to walk and to please You, O God, I want to follow Paul's exhortation in the Lord Jesus to do this more and more. (1 Thessalonians 4:1)

Physical exercise profits a little, but godliness is profitable for all things, since it holds promise for both the present life and the life to come. (1 Timothy 4:8)

I want to be an example for other believers in speech, in behavior, in love, in faith and in purity. (1 Timothy 4:12)

I will flee youthful lusts and pursue righteousness, faith, love and peace, with those who call on You, Lord, out of a pure heart. (2 Timothy 2:22)

As one who has believed in You, O God, I want to be careful to devote myself to doing what is good. These things are good and

profitable for everyone. (Titus 3:8)

I will pursue peace with all people and sanctification, without which no one will see You, O Lord. (Hebrews 12:14)

If I know the good I ought to do and do not do it, to me it is sin. (James 4:17)

Since I call on You, Father, who judge everyone's work impartially, I should conduct myself in reverent fear during the time of my sojourn on earth. (1 Peter 1:17)

I should live as one who is free, not using my freedom as a cloak for evil, but as Your servant, O God. (1 Peter 2:16)

I will be diligent to add to my faith, virtue; and to virtue, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness, love. For if these qualities are mine in increasing measure, they will keep me from being barren and unfruitful in the full knowledge of You, our Lord Jesus Christ. (2 Peter 1:5–8)

If I say that I have fellowship with You, O God, and yet walk in the darkness, I lie and do not practice the truth. But if I walk in the light, as You are in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, Your Son, purifies me from all sin. (1 John 1:6–7)

My desire is to continue to walk in the truth and to take pleasure when others do the same. (3 John 3–4)

I will not imitate what is evil but what is good. The one who does good is from You, O God; the one who does evil has not seen You. (3 John 11)

Love and Compassion

I will not let love and truth leave me; I will bind them around my neck and write them on the tablet of my heart. (Proverbs 3:3)

Those who are righteous have regard for the needs of their animals, but the mercies of the wicked are cruel. (Proverbs 12:10)

Through love and truth iniquity is atoned for; by the fear of You, O Lord, one turns aside from evil. When our ways are pleasing to You, Lord, You make even our enemies live at peace with us. (Proverbs 16:6–7)

If we pursue righteousness and love, we will find life, righteousness and honor. (Proverbs 21:21)

I will sow righteousness, reap the fruit of unfailing love, and break up my fallow ground; for it is time to seek You, Lord, until You come and rain righteousness on me. (Hosea 10:12)

Show me how to love, O Lord, for if I speak in human language and the language of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have the gift of prophecy and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. And if I give all my possessions to the poor, and if I deliver my body to be burned, but have not love, it profits me nothing. (1 Corinthians 13:1–3)

The love we have from You, O Lord, is patient, it is kind, it does not envy; love does not boast, it is not arrogant, it does not behave rudely; it does not seek its own, it is not provoked, it keeps no record of wrongs; it does not rejoice in unrighteousness but rejoices with the truth; it bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails. (1 Corinthians 13:4–8)

I want everything I do to be done in love. (1 Corinthians 16:14)

I want to abound in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all diligence, in love and in the grace of giving. (2 Corinthians 8:7)

I will imitate You, O God, as Your beloved child, and I will walk in love, just as Christ loved me and gave Himself up for me as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to You. (Ephesians 5:1–2)

As one of Your chosen people, O God, holy and beloved, I will put on a heart of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience, bearing with others and forgiving others even as You, Lord, forgave me; and above all these things I will put on love, which is the bond of perfection. (Colossians 3:12–14)

The goal of the instruction of Your Word, O Lord, is love that comes from a pure heart and a good conscience and a sincere faith. (1 Timothy 1:5)

I will keep the pattern of sound teaching that I have heard, in faith and love which are in You, Christ Jesus. (2 Timothy 1:13)

I will not love with words or tongue but will strive to love in deed and in truth. By this I will know that I am of the truth and my heart will be assured before You; for if my heart condemns me, You, O God, are greater than my heart, and You know all things. If my heart does not condemn me, I have confidence before You and receive from You whatever I ask, because I keep Your commandments and do the things that are pleasing in Your sight. (1 John 3:18–22)

This is love: that I walk in obedience to Your commandments, O God. And this is the commandment that I have heard from the beginning: I should walk in love. (2 John 6)

Wisdom, Discernment and Understanding

I ask for a wise and understanding heart to discern between good and evil. (1 Kings 3:9, 12)

Lord, make me to know my end and what is the measure of my days; let me know how fleeting my life is. (Psalm 39:4)

Teach me to number my days, that I may gain a heart of wisdom. (Psalm 90:12)

If I am wise, I will consider Your lovingkindness, O Lord. (Psalm 107:43)

To fear You, Lord, is the beginning of wisdom; all who practice Your commandments have good understanding. Your praise endures forever. (Psalm 111:10)

The entrance of Your words gives light; it gives understanding to the simple. (Psalm 119:130)

Lord, You give wisdom; from Your mouth come knowledge and understanding. You store up sound wisdom for the upright; You are a shield to those who walk in integrity, guarding the paths of the just and protecting the way of Your saints. Then I will understand righteousness and justice and honesty—every good path. For wisdom will enter my heart, and knowledge will be pleasant to my soul; discretion will protect me, and understanding will guard me. (Proverbs 2:6–11)

I will preserve sound wisdom and discretion, not letting them out of my sight; they will be life to my soul. (Proverbs 3:21–22)

Wisdom is foremost; therefore I will get wisdom, and though it cost all I have, I will get understanding. I will esteem her, and she will exalt me; I will embrace her, and she will honor me. (Proverbs 4:7–8)

I will guard my heart with all diligence, for out of it flow the issues of life. (Proverbs 4:23)

Wisdom is better than jewels, and all desirable things cannot be compared with her. Wisdom dwells together with prudence and finds knowledge and discretion. (Proverbs 8:11–12)

Blessed are those who listen to wisdom, watching daily at her gates, waiting at her doorposts. For whoever finds wisdom finds life and obtains favor from the Lord. But those who fail to find her injure their own souls; all who hate her love death. (Proverbs 8:34–36)

To fear You, O Lord, is the beginning of wisdom, and to know You, O Holy One, is understanding. (Proverbs 9:10)

The fruit of the righteous is a tree of life, and those who win souls are wise. (Proverbs 11:30)

There is a way that may seem right to me, but its end is the way of death. (Proverbs 14:12)

The fear of You, O Lord, is a fountain of life to turn one away from the snares of death. (Proverbs 14:27)

If I trust in my own heart, I am foolish, but if I walk in wisdom, I will be delivered. (Proverbs 28:26)

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven. (Ecclesiastes 3:1)

The words of the wise are like goads and like nails driven by the masters who collect them; they are given by You, the one Shepherd. (Ecclesiastes 12:11)

You are the stability of our times, a wealth of salvation, wisdom, and knowledge; to fear You, Lord, is the key to this treasure. (Isaiah 33:6)

Whoever is wise understands these things; whoever is discerning knows them. Your ways, O Lord, are right; the righteous will walk in them, but transgressors will stumble in them. (Hosea 14:9)

In my obedience, I want to be wise about what is good and innocent about what is evil. (Romans 16:19)

I will not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers. For what does righteousness share with wickedness? Or what fellowship does light have with darkness? (2 Corinthians 6:14)

Though I walk in the flesh, I do not war according to the flesh. The weapons of my warfare are not fleshly, but divinely powerful to overthrow strongholds, casting down arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of You, O God, and taking every thought captive to the obedience of Christ. (2 Corinthians 10:3–5)

I will watch carefully how I walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. I will not be foolish, but understand what Your will is, O Lord. (Ephesians 5:15–17)

Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is of good report—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—I will think about such things. The things I have learned and received and heard and seen in those who walk with Christ, I will practice, and You, O God of peace, will be with me. (Philippians 4:8–9)

I will see to it that no one takes me captive through deceptive philosophy, which is based on human tradition and the basic principles of this world, rather than on You, O Christ. (Colossians 2:8)

I will examine all things, hold fast to the good and abstain from every form of evil. (1 Thessalonians 5:21–22)

If I lack wisdom, I should ask You, O God, who gives generously to all without reproach, and it will be given to me. (James 1:5)

Those who are wise and understanding will show it by their good conduct and works done in the humility that comes from wisdom. If I harbor bitter envy and selfish ambition in my heart, I should not boast and lie against the truth. This wisdom does not come down from above, but is earthly, natural, demonic. For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there is disorder and every evil practice. (James 3:13–16)

The wisdom that comes from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, submissive, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality and hypocrisy. And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace. (James 3:17–18)

Moral Integrity and Honesty

I shall not murder. (Exodus 20:13; Deuteronomy 5:17)

I shall not commit adultery. (Exodus 20:14; Deuteronomy 5:18)

I shall not steal. (Exodus 20:15; Deuteronomy 5:19)

I will not follow the crowd in doing wrong. (Exodus 23:2)

I will not accept a bribe, for a bribe blinds those who see and perverts the words of the righteous. (Exodus 23:8)

I will not steal, nor deal falsely, nor deceive others. (Leviticus 19:11)

I will not be dishonest in judgment, in measurement of weight or quantity. I will be honest and just in my business affairs. (Leviticus 19:35–36)

I will not show partiality in judgment; I will hear both small and great alike. I will not be afraid of anyone, for judgment belongs to You, O God. (Deuteronomy 1:17)

I know, my God, that You test my heart and are pleased with integrity. (1 Chronicles 29:17)

May those who hope in You not be ashamed because of me, O Lord God of hosts.

May those who seek You not be dishonored because of me, O God of Israel. (Psalm 69:6)

Blessed am I if I maintain justice, if I do righteousness at all times. (Psalm 106:3)

I will not enter the path of the wicked or walk in the way of evil people. (Proverbs 4:14)

To fear You, O Lord, is to hate evil; wisdom hates pride and arrogance and the evil way and the perverse mouth. (Proverbs 8:13)

If I walk in integrity, I walk securely, but those who pervert their ways will be found out. (Proverbs 10:9)

If I gain wealth by dishonesty, it will dwindle, but if I gather it by labor, it will increase. (Proverbs 13:11)

Those who walk in uprightness fear You, Lord, but those who are devious in their ways despise You. (Proverbs 14:2)

The one who justifies the wicked and the one who condemns the just—both of them are detestable to You, Lord. (Proverbs 17:15)

A good name is more desirable than great riches; favor is better than silver or gold. (Proverbs 22:1)

Whoever is faithful with very little is also faithful with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. If I am not faithful in handling worldly wealth, who will trust me with true riches? And if I am not faithful with someone else's property, who will give me property of my own? (Luke 16:10–12)

I will walk properly as in the daytime, not in partying and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and evil conduct, not in dissension and jealousy. Instead I will put on You, Lord Jesus Christ, like clothing, rather than thinking about how to satisfy my fleshly lusts. (Romans 13:13–14)

I will keep Your feast, O Christ, my Passover, not with old leaven, or with the leaven of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth. (1 Corinthians 5:7–8)

I do not want even a hint of immorality, or any impurity or greed in my life, as these are improper for a saint. Nor will I give myself over to obscenity, foolish talk or coarse joking which are not fitting, but rather I will give myself to thanksgiving. (Ephesians 5:3–4)

I will consider the parts of my earthly body as dead to immorality, impurity, passion, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry. Because of these, O God, Your wrath is coming. I used to walk in these ways in the life I once lived. (Colossians 3:5–7)

This is Your will, O God, that I be sanctified, that I abstain from immorality and learn to control my own body in holiness and honor. For You did not call me to be impure, but to live a holy life. (1 Thessalonians 4:3–4, 7)

I desire to have a clear conscience and to live honorably in all things. (Hebrews 13:18)

I will not say when I am tempted, "I am being tempted by God"; for You, O God, cannot be tempted by evil, nor do You tempt anyone. But we are tempted when we are drawn away and enticed by our own lust. Then, after lust has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and sin, when it is full-grown, gives birth to death. (James 1:13–15)

I have been born again, not of perishable seed, but of imperishable, through Your living and abiding word, O God. Therefore, I will put away all malice and all guile and hypocrisy and envy and all slander. (1 Peter 1:23; 2:1)

Truthfulness and Prudence

I shall not bear false witness against my neighbor. (Exodus 20:16; Deuteronomy 5:20)

I will not go about spreading slander among people, nor will I do anything that endangers the life of my neighbor. (Leviticus 19:16)

I will put away perversity from my mouth and keep corrupt talk far from my lips. (Proverbs 4:24)

The mouth of the righteous is a fountain of life, but violence covers the mouth of the wicked. (Proverbs 10:11)

In a multitude of words, transgression does not cease, but if I restrain my lips, I am wise. (Proverbs 10:19)

A talebearer reveals secrets, but the person who is trustworthy conceals a matter. (Proverbs 11:13)

I will be satisfied with good from the fruit of my mouth, and the deeds of my hands will return to me. (Proverbs 12:14)

Reckless words pierce like a sword, but the tongue of the wise brings healing. (Proverbs 12:18)

Lying lips are hateful to You, Lord, but You delight in those who deal faithfully. (Proverbs 12:22)

A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger. The tongue of the wise uses knowledge rightly, but the mouth of the fool pours out folly. (Proverbs 15:1–2)

The tongue that brings healing is a tree of life, but perverseness in it crushes the spirit. (Proverbs 15:4)

Joy is found in giving an apt reply—and how good is a timely word! (Proverbs 15:23)

Fools have no delight in understanding but only in airing their own opinions. (Proverbs 18:2)

The words of a gossip are like choice morsels; they go down into the innermost parts of the body. (Proverbs 18:8)

The one who answers a matter before listening is foolish and shameful. (Proverbs 18:13)

Faithful are the wounds of a friend, but the kisses of an enemy are deceitful. (Proverbs 27:6)

These are the things I shall do: speak the truth to others, and judge with truth and justice for peace. I shall not plot evil against my neighbor, nor love a false oath, for these things You hate, O Lord. (Zechariah 8:16–17)

I will not let any corrupt word come out of my mouth, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may impart grace to those who hear. (Ephesians 4:29)

I will put away all of these things: anger, wrath, malice, slander and abusive language from my mouth. (Colossians 3:8)

I should be quick to hear, slow to speak, and slow to anger, for human anger does not produce Your righteousness, O God. (James 1:19–20)

The tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. I will consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil that is set among the parts of the body, that corrupts the whole body, and sets the whole course of our life on fire and is set on fire by hell. (James 3:5–6)

People have tamed all kinds of animals, birds, reptiles, and creatures of the sea and they are still being tamed, but no one can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With the tongue we praise You, our Lord and Father, and with it we curse the ones who have been made in Your likeness, O God; out of the same mouth come blessing and cursing, and this should not be. (James 3:7–10)

Humility

When I am blessed with abundance, I will beware lest my heart become proud, and I forget You, O Lord my God, who provide all good things—lest I think that it was my power and the strength of my hand that brought this wealth. (Deuteronomy 8:12–14, 17)

When pride comes, then comes dishonor, but with humility comes wisdom. (Proverbs 11:2)

To fear You, Lord, is instruction for wisdom, and humility comes before honor. (Proverbs 15:33)

It is better to be of a humble spirit with the lowly than to divide the spoil with the proud. (Proverbs 16:19)

Before my downfall my heart is haughty, but humility comes before honor. (Proverbs 18:12)

Haughty eyes and a proud heart, the lamp of the wicked, are sin. (Proverbs 21:4)

Humility and the fear of You, O Lord, bring wealth and honor and life. (Proverbs 22:4)

I will not boast about tomorrow, for I do not know what that day may bring. (Proverbs 27:1)

I will let another praise me, and not my own mouth; a stranger, and not my own lips. (Proverbs 27:2)

If I am proud, it will bring me low, but if I am humble of spirit, I will gain honor. (Proverbs 29:23)

The proud will be humbled and the lofty will be brought low; You alone, O Lord, will be exalted. (Isaiah 2:11)

The one You esteem is humble and contrite of spirit and trembles at Your word. (Isaiah 66:2)

Should I seek great things for myself? I will seek them not. (Jeremiah 45:5)

You have called the humble of the earth, who have upheld Your justice, to seek You, Lord, to seek righteousness and to seek humility. (Zephaniah 2:3)

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. (Matthew 5:3–5)

I will not trust in myself or in my own righteousness, nor will I view others with contempt. (Luke 18:9)

I will be of the same mind with others; I will not be haughty in mind or wise in my own estimation, but I will associate with the humble. (Romans 12:16)

Who makes me different from anyone else? And what do I have that I did not receive? And if I did receive it, why should I boast as though I had not received it? (1 Corinthians 4:7)

I do not dare to classify or compare myself with other people, for it is unwise to measure or compare myself with others. I will not boast beyond proper limits but within the sphere of the gospel of Christ. "Let those who boast boast in the Lord." For it is not those who commend themselves who are approved, but the ones whom You, Lord, commend. (2 Corinthians 10:12–14, 17–18)

If I think I am something when I am nothing, I deceive myself. (Galatians 6:3)

I want to walk in a way that is worthy of the calling with which I was called, with all humility and meekness and patience. (Ephesians 4:1–2)

I should let my gentleness be evident to all people; O Lord, You are near. (Philippians 4:5)

I will submit myself to You, O God, and resist the devil, and he will flee from me. I will humble myself before You, O Lord, and You will exalt me. (James 4:7, 10)

I should not say, "Today or tomorrow I will go to this or that city, spend a year there, carry on business, and make a profit." For I do not even know what my life will be tomorrow. I am a vapor that appears for a little while and then vanishes away. Instead I ought to say, "If the Lord wills, I will live and do this or that." Otherwise, I boast in my arrogance, and all such boasting is evil. (James 4:13–16)

I will humble myself under Your mighty hand, O God, that You may exalt me in due time; I will cast all my anxiety upon You, because You care for me. (1 Peter 5:6–7)

Teachability

Before I was afflicted, I went astray, O Lord, but now I keep Your word. It was good for me to be afflicted, so that I might learn Your statutes. (Psalm 119:67, 71)

Your commandment is a lamp, O Lord; Your teaching is a light, and Your reproofs of discipline are the way to life. (Proverbs 6:23)

If I heed instruction, I am on the path of life, but if I refuse correction, I will go astray. (Proverbs 10:17)

If I listen to a life-giving rebuke, I will be at home among the wise. If I refuse instruction, I despise myself, but if I heed correction, I will gain understanding. (Proverbs 15:31–32)

If I heed the word, I will prosper, and I will be blessed if I trust in You, O Lord. (Proverbs 16:20)

I will listen to counsel and accept instruction, that I may be wise in my latter days. (Proverbs 19:20)

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction and for training in righteousness, that we, Your people, may be thoroughly equipped for every good work. (2 Timothy 3:16–17)

I will not despise Your discipline, O Lord, nor lose heart when You rebuke me, for whom You love You discipline, and You chastise every child whom You receive. (Hebrews 12:5–6)

I will endure discipline, for You, O God, are treating me as Your child. For what child is not disciplined by its father? If I am without discipline (and we all undergo discipline), then I am an illegitimate child and not a true child. Moreover, we have all had human fathers who disciplined us, and we respected them; how much more should

I be disciplined by You, the Father of my spirit, and live? (Hebrews 12:7–9)

Contentment, Single-mindedness and Peace

I shall not covet my neighbor's house, my neighbor's wife, his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to my neighbor. (Exodus 20:17; Deuteronomy 5:21)

This is the day that You, O Lord, have made; I will rejoice and be glad in it. (Psalm 118:24)

A heart at peace gives life to the body, but envy is rottenness to the bones. (Proverbs 14:30)

Better a little with the fear of You, O Lord, than great wealth with turmoil. (Proverbs 15:16)

Better is a little with righteousness than great income with injustice. (Proverbs 16:8)

I will have the understanding to cease. I will not set my desire on what flies away, for wealth surely sprouts wings and flies into the heavens like an eagle. (Proverbs 23:4–5)

I will eat and drink and see good in all my labor—it is Your gift, O God. (Ecclesiastes 3:13)

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see You, O God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called Your children, O God. (Matthew 5:8–9)

I will not lay up for myself treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal. But I will lay up for myself treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where my treasure is, there my heart will be also. (Matthew 6:19–21; Luke 12:34)

I cannot serve two masters; for either I will hate the one and love the other, or I will be devoted to the one and despise the other. I cannot serve You. God. and wealth. (Matthew 6:24: Luke 16:13)

I will not worry about my life, what I will eat or what I will drink; or about my body, what I will wear. Life is more than food, and the body more than clothes. The birds of the air do not sow or reap or gather into barns, and vet You, my heavenly Father, feed them. Am I not much more valuable than they? Can I add a single hour to my life by worrying? And why do I worry about clothes? I will consider how the lilies of the field grow; they neither labor nor spin, yet not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. But if You, O God, so clothe the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will You not much more clothe me? So I will not worry, saying, "What shall I eat?" or "What shall I drink?" or "What shall I wear?" For the pagans run after all these things, and You, my heavenly Father, know that I need them. But I will seek first Your kingdom and Your righteousness, and all these things will be added to me. (Matthew 6:25-33; Luke 12:22-31)

I will not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own. (Matthew 6:34)

I do not want to be worried and troubled about many things; only one thing is needed. Like Mary, I want to choose what is better, that which will not be taken away from me. (Luke 10:41–42)

I will be on my guard against all covetousness, for my life does not consist in the abundance of my possessions. (Luke 12:15)

I do not want to lay up treasure for myself without being rich toward You, O God. (Luke 12:21)

I will be anxious for nothing, but in everything, by prayer and petition with thanksgiving, I will let my requests be known to You, O God. And Your peace, O God, which transcends all understanding, will guard my heart and my mind in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:6–7)

I want to learn to be content in whatever circumstances I am. Whether I am abased or in abundance, whether I am filled or hungry, I want to learn the secret of being content in any and every situation. I can do all things through You who strengthen me. (Philippians 4:11–13)

I will let Your peace, O Christ, to which I was called as a member of one body, rule in my heart, and I will be thankful. (Colossians 3:15)

Godliness with contentment is great gain. For I brought nothing into the world, and I can take nothing out of it. But if I have food and clothing, with these I will be content. (1 Timothy 6:6–8)

I will keep my life free from the love of money and be content with what I have, for You have said, "I will never leave you, nor will I forsake you." (Hebrews 13:5)

I want to be a person of faith, who does not doubt Your promises, O God, and not one who is double-minded and unstable in my ways. (James 1:6, 8)

I know that friendship with the world is enmity toward You, God. Those who want to be friends of the world makes themselves Your enemies, O God. (James 4:4)

I will not love the world or the things in the world. If I love the world, Your love, O Father, is not in me. For all that is in the world —the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life—is not of You, Father, but of the world. And the world and its lusts are passing away, but the one who does Your will, O God, abides forever. (1 John 2:15–17)

Discipline and Self-control

Like Ezra, I want to set my heart to study Your word, O Lord, and to do it, and to teach it to others. (Ezra 7:10)

How can young people keep their way pure? By keeping it according to Your word. (Psalm 119:9)

I have hidden Your word in my heart that I might not sin against You. (Psalm 119:11)

O Lord, You are my portion; I have promised to keep Your words. I considered my ways and turned my steps to Your testimonies. (Psalm 119:57, 59)

I have kept my feet from every evil path that I might keep Your word. I gain understanding from Your precepts; therefore I hate every false way. (Psalm 119:101, 104)

Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path. I have inclined my heart to perform Your statutes to the very end. (Psalm 119:105, 112)

The wise fear and depart from evil, but fools are arrogant and bold. Those who are quick-tempered act foolishly, and those who plot evil are hated. (Proverbs 14:16–17)

A hot-tempered person stirs up dissension, but the one who is slow to anger calms a quarrel. (Proverbs 15:18)

Laziness casts one into a deep sleep, and an idle person will be hungry. (Proverbs 19:15)

I will not be quickly provoked in my spirit, for anger rests in the bosom of fools. (Ecclesiastes 7:9)

In my anger I will not sin; I will not let the sun go down while I am still angry, and I will not give the devil a foothold. (Ephesians 4:26–27)

I will devote myself to prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving. (Colossians 4:2)

I will make it my ambition to lead a quiet life, to mind my own business, and to work with my own hands, so that my walk will win the respect of those who are outside and I will lack nothing. (1 Thessalonians 4:11–12)

We are all children of the light and children of the day. We do not belong to the night or to the darkness. So then, let us not be like others who are asleep, but let us be alert and self-controlled. (1 Thessalonians 5:5–6)

Since I belong to the day, I will be self-controlled, putting on faith and love as a breastplate and the hope of salvation as a helmet. (1 Thessalonians 5:8)

I want to be above reproach, temperate, sensible, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, not given to drunkenness, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money. I want to manage my family well and keep my children under control with proper respect. And I want a good reputation with outsiders, so that I will not fall into disgrace and the snare of the devil. (1 Timothy 3:2–4, 7)

I want to be worthy of respect, not double-tongued, not addicted to wine, not fond of dishonest gain, but holding the mystery of the faith with a clear conscience. (1 Timothy 3:8–9)

I will not neglect my spiritual gifts. (1 Timothy 4:14)

You, O God, have not given me a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-control. (2 Timothy 1:7)

O God, I will be diligent to present myself to You as one approved, a worker who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth. (2 Timothy 2:15)

Your grace, O God, has appeared, bringing salvation to all people, teaching us to deny ungodliness and worldly passions and to live sensibly, righteously, and godly in the present age. (Titus 2:11–12)

I will prepare my mind for action and be self-controlled, setting my hope fully on the grace to be given to me at Your revelation, Christ Jesus. (1 Peter 1:13)

The end of all things is near; therefore I will be clear minded and self-controlled for prayer. (1 Peter 4:7)

I will be self-controlled and alert; my adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. But I will resist him, standing firm in the faith, knowing that my brothers and sisters throughout the world are undergoing the same kind of sufferings. (1 Peter 5:8–9)

Courage and Perseverance

I will be strong and courageous, being careful to obey Your word, O Lord; I will not turn from it to the right or to the left, that I may act wisely wherever I go. (Joshua 1:7)

I will be strong and courageous; I will not be afraid or discouraged, for You, Lord my God, will be with me wherever I go. (Joshua 1:9)

I will be strong and courageous and act. I will not be afraid or discouraged, for You, Lord God, are with me. You will not fail me or forsake me. (1 Chronicles 28:20)

I will not be afraid of my adversaries, but I will remember You, Lord, who are great and awesome. (Nehemiah 4:14)

I will take courage and not be afraid, for You, Lord Jesus, are with me. (Mark 6:50)

I will rejoice in hope, persevere in affliction and continue steadfastly in prayer. (Romans 12:12)

Thanks be to You, O God, the One who gives me the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore I will be steadfast, immovable, abounding in Your work, Lord, knowing that my labor in You is not in vain. (1 Corinthians 15:57–58)

I will be on my guard, stand firm in the faith, act with courage, and be strong. (1 Corinthians 16:13)

I am hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying about in my body Your death, O Jesus, so that Your life may also be revealed in my body. For we who live are always being delivered over to death for Your sake, Jesus, so that Your life may be revealed in our mortal bodies. (2 Corinthians 4:8–11)

I will not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time I will reap a harvest if I do not give up. (Galatians 6:9)

I ask You, Lord, to establish my heart as blameless and holy before our God and Father at Your coming, our Lord Jesus, with all Your saints. (1 Thessalonians 3:13)

May You Yourself, our Lord Jesus Christ, and God our Father, who have loved us and have given us eternal consolation and good hope by grace, comfort our hearts and strengthen us in every good work and word. (2 Thessalonians 2:16–17)

I do not want to grow weary in doing what is right. (2 Thessalonians 3:13)

I will fight the good fight of faith and lay hold of the eternal life to which I was called when I made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses. In Your sight, O God, who gives life to all things, and in the sight of Christ Jesus, who testified the good confession before Pontius Pilate, I want to keep this command without blemish or reproach until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ, which You will bring about in Your own time. (1 Timothy 6:12–15)

I will be self-controlled in all things, endure hardship, do the work of an evangelist and fulfill my ministry. (2 Timothy 4:5)

I will fight the good fight, finish the race, and keep the faith, so that there will be laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which You, Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day; and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for Your appearing. (2 Timothy 4:7–8)

Since I have a great cloud of witnesses surrounding me, I want to lay aside every impediment and the sin that so easily entangles, and run with endurance the race that is set before me, fixing my eyes on You, Jesus, the author and perfecter of my faith, who for the joy set before You endured the cross, despising the shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. I will consider You who endured such hostility from sinners, so that I will not grow weary and lose heart. (Hebrews 12:1–3)

I will consider it all joy whenever I fall into various trials, knowing that the testing of my faith produces endurance. And I will let endurance finish its work, so that I may be mature and complete, lacking in nothing. (James 1:2–4)

I will be blessed if I persevere under trial, because when I have been approved, I will receive the crown of life that You, O God, have promised to those who love You. (James 1:12)

I greatly rejoice in my salvation, though now for a little while, if necessary, I have been grieved by various trials, so that my faith,

being much more precious than gold, that perishes even though refined by fire, may be proved genuine and may result in praise, glory and honor when You, O Jesus Christ, are revealed. (1 Peter 1:6–7)

Who is going to harm me if I am eager to do good? But even if I should suffer for what is right, I am blessed, and I will not fear what they fear or be intimidated. (1 Peter 3:13–14)

Since Your day, O Lord, will come like a thief, what kind of person should I be in conduct and life as I look forward to the coming of Your day? According to Your promise, I am looking for a new heaven and a new earth, in which righteousness dwells. Therefore, since I am looking for these things, I will be diligent so that You find me in peace—spotless and blameless, living a holy and godly life. (2 Peter 3:10–14)

I will abide in You, O Christ, so that when You appear, I may have confidence and not be ashamed before You at Your coming. (1 John 2:28)

Being built up in the most holy faith and praying in the Holy Spirit, I want to keep myself in Your love, O God, as I wait for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ to bring me to eternal life. (Jude 20–21)

MY RELATIONSHIP TO OTHERS

Love and Acceptance

I will not hate my brother or sister in my heart. (Leviticus 19:17)

I will not take vengeance or bear a grudge against others, but I will love my neighbor as myself. (Leviticus 19:18)

If we erase a sin by forgiving it, we show love. But if we repeat the matter, we come between close friends. (Proverbs 17:9)

If I forgive others for their transgressions, You, my heavenly Father, will also forgive me. (Matthew 6:14)

I will not judge, so that I will not be judged. For in the same way I judge others, I will be judged; and with the measure I use, it will be measured to me. (Matthew 7:1–2)

I shall seek to keep Your commandments, O God: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments. (Matthew 22:37–40)

I will love my enemies, do good to those who hate me, bless those who curse me, and pray for those who mistreat me. I will do to others as I would have them do to me. (Luke 6:27–28, 31)

I will love my enemies, do good to them and lend to them, expecting nothing in return. Then my reward will be great, and I will be Your child, O Most High; for You are kind to the ungrateful and evil. I will be merciful just as You, Father, are merciful. (Luke 6:35–36)

If I do not judge, I will not be judged; if I do not condemn, I will not be condemned; if I forgive, I will be forgiven. (Luke 6:37)

O Lord, You have given us a new commandment: to love one another even as You have loved us, so we must love one another. By this all people will know that we are Your disciples, if we have love for one another. (John 13:34)

My love must be sincere. I will hate what is evil and cling to what is good. (Romans 12:9)

We must be devoted to one another in love, honoring one another above ourselves. (Romans 12:10)

I will bless those who persecute me; I will bless and not curse. (Romans 12:14)

I will rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep. (Romans 12:15)

I will accept those whose faith is weak, without passing judgment on their opinions. Who am I to judge another's servant? Whether or not they stand or fall is their master's concern, and they will stand, for You, Lord, are able to make them stand. (Romans 14:1, 4)

I will not judge my brothers and sisters or regard them with contempt. Instead of judging them, I will resolve not to put a stumbling block or obstacle in their way. (Romans 14:10, 13)

I will accept others just as You, O Jesus Christ, accepted me to the glory of God. (Romans 15:7)

I was called to freedom, but I will not use my freedom to indulge the flesh but through love I will serve others. For the whole law is summed up in this word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Galatians 5:13–14)

I will put away all bitterness and anger and wrath and shouting and slander, along with all malice. And I will be kind and compassionate to others, forgiving them just as You, O God, in Christ also forgave me. (Ephesians 4:31–32)

I will bear with others and forgive whatever complaints I have against them; I will forgive just as You, O Lord, forgave me. (Colossians 3:13)

I ask that You, O Lord, make me increase and abound in my love for believers and for unbelievers. (1 Thessalonians 3:12)

Concerning our love for our brothers and sisters: You have taught us, O God, to love each other, and You, Lord, urge us to increase our love more and more. (1 Thessalonians 4:9–10)

We must continue to love as brothers and sisters. (Hebrews 13:1)

I will not slander other believers. Anyone who slanders his brother or sister or judges them slanders the law and judges the law. When I judge the law, I am not a doer of the law, but a judge. You are the only Lawgiver and Judge, the One who is able to save and to destroy. Who am I to judge my neighbor? (James 4:11–12)

Above all, I will have a fervent love for others, because love covers a multitude of sins. (1 Peter 4:8)

This is the message we heard from the beginning: that we should love one another. We know that we have passed out of death into life, because we love our brothers and sisters. The one who does not love abides in death. By this we know love, that You, O Christ, laid

down Your life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. (1 John 3:11, 14, 16)

We should love one another, for love is from You, O God, and everyone who loves has been born of You, and knows You. Whoever does not love does not know You, for You, O God, are love. (1 John 4:7–8)

In this is love, not that we loved You, God, but that You loved us and sent Your Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Since You, O God, so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen You, O God; but if we love one another, You, O God, abide in us, and Your love is perfected in us. (1 John 4:10–12)

Giving and Serving

I will give generously to others without a grudging heart. (Deuteronomy 15:10)

I will not withhold good from those to whom it is due, when it is within my power to act. (Proverbs 3:27)

If I am generous, I will prosper; if I water others, I will myself be refreshed. (Proverbs 11:25)

If we oppress the poor, we reproach You, our Maker, but if we are kind to the needy, we honor You. (Proverbs 14:31)

Those who are generous will be blessed, for they share their food with the poor. (Proverbs 22:9)

I will learn to do good, seek justice, remove the oppressor, defend the orphan and plead for the widow. (Isaiah 1:17)

Is this not the fast You have chosen: to loose the bonds of wickedness, to undo the cords of the yoke, and to let the oppressed

go free and break every yoke? Is it not to share our food with the hungry and to provide the poor wanderer with shelter; when we see the naked, to clothe them, and not to turn away from our own flesh? Then our light will break forth like the dawn, and our healing will quickly appear, and our righteousness will go before us; Your glory, O Lord, will be our rear guard. Then we will call, and You will answer; we will cry, and You will say, "Here I am." If we put away the yoke from our midst, the pointing of the finger and malicious talk, and if we extend our souls to the hungry and satisfy the afflicted soul, then our light will rise in the darkness, and our gloom will become like the noonday. (Isaiah 58:6–10)

If I give another a cup of water to drink in Your name as Your follower, O Christ, I will by no means lose my reward. (Mark 9:41)

When I give, it will be given to me; good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be poured into my lap. For with the measure I use, it will be measured back to me. (Luke 6:38)

If I invite the poor, the crippled, the lame and the blind when I give a reception, I will be blessed, because they cannot repay me; I will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous. (Luke 14:13–14)

I will contribute to the needs of the saints and practice hospitality. (Romans 12:13)

Those who sow sparingly will also reap sparingly, and those who sow bountifully will also reap bountifully. We should give as we have decided in our hearts, not reluctantly or under compulsion; for You, O God, love a cheerful giver. And You are able to make all grace abound to us, so that always having all sufficiency in everything, we may abound in every good work. As it is written: "He has scattered abroad His gifts to the poor; His righteousness endures forever." Now You, the One who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food, will also supply and increase our seed and will increase the fruits of our righteousness. (2 Corinthians 9:6–10)

Because of our ministry of supplying the needs of the saints, they will glorify You, O God, for the obedience that accompanies our confession of the gospel of Christ, and for our liberality of sharing with them and with everyone else. (2 Corinthians 9:13)

I will not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some have entertained angels without knowing it. (Hebrews 13:2)

I will remember those in prison as though bound with them, and those who are mistreated, since I myself am also in the body. (Hebrews 13:3)

This is pure and undefiled religion before You, my God and Father: to visit orphans and widows in their affliction and to keep oneself unspotted by the world. (James 1:27)

As each of us has received a gift, we should use it to serve others, as good stewards of Your manifold grace, O God. (1 Peter 4:10)

General Affirmations

I will not defraud my neighbors or rob them. (Leviticus 19:13)

I will do no injustice in judgment, nor show partiality to the poor or favoritism to the great, but I will judge my neighbor fairly. (Leviticus 19:15)

I will not hate my brother or sister in my heart, but I will reprove my neighbors frankly and not incur sin because of them. (Leviticus 19:17)

I will not mistreat my neighbors, but I will fear You, God; for You are the Lord my God. (Leviticus 25:17)

I will trust in You enough to honor You, O Lord, as holy in the sight of others. (Numbers 20:12)

Far be it from me that I should sin against You, Lord, by ceasing to pray for others. (1 Samuel 12:23)

I will not plan evil against my neighbors, since they live trustfully by me. (Proverbs 3:29)

I will not bring charges against others without cause, if they have done me no harm. (Proverbs 3:30)

I will stay away from foolish people, for I will not find knowledge on their lips. (Proverbs 14:7)

Starting a quarrel is like breaching a dam, so I will stop a quarrel before it breaks out. (Proverbs 17:14)

I will not make friends with hot-tempered people or associate with those easily angered, lest I learn their ways and set a snare for my soul. (Proverbs 22:24–25)

I will not repay anyone evil for evil, but I will seek to do what is right in the sight of all. (Romans 12:17)

If it is possible, I will live at peace with all people, as far as it depends on me. (Romans 12:18)

I will not take revenge but leave room for Your wrath, O God, for You have said: "Vengeance is Mine; I will repay." I will not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. (Romans 12:19, 21)

I will give to all what they are due: taxes to whom taxes are due, custom to whom custom, respect to whom respect, honor to whom honor. (Romans 13:7)

O God, You comfort us in all our afflictions, so that we can comfort those in any affliction with the comfort we ourselves have received from You, O God. (2 Corinthians 1:4)

I will not give cause for offense in anything, so that my ministry will not be discredited. (2 Corinthians 6:3)

I will not become conceited, provoking others and envying others. (Galatians 5:26)

May I obey those who are in authority over me with fear and trembling and with sincerity of heart, as I would obey Christ, not with external service as one who wants to please people, but as a slave of Christ, doing Your will, O God, from my heart. With good will may I serve as if I were serving you, O Lord, and not people, knowing that I will receive back from You whatever good I do. (Ephesians 6:5–8)

I will treat subordinates with respect, not threatening them, knowing that You, O Lord, are both their Master and mine and that You are in heaven, and there is no partiality with You. (Ephesians 6:9)

I will do all things without complaining or arguing, so that I may become blameless and pure—Your child, O God, without fault in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, among whom I shine as a light in the world, holding out the word of life. (Philippians 2:14–16)

I will obey those who are in authority over me in all things, not with external service, as one who pleases people, but with a sincere heart, fearing You, Lord. Whatever I do, I will work at it with all my heart, as working for You, and not for people, knowing that I will receive the reward of the inheritance from You. It is You I am serving, Lord Jesus Christ. (Colossians 3:22–24)

I will provide my subordinates with what is just and fair, knowing that I also have a master—You, my Master in heaven. (Colossians 4:1)

I will not repay evil for evil to anyone, but I will pursue what is good for others. (1 Thessalonians 5:15)

I am to provide for my own, and especially for my family, so I do not deny the faith and become worse than an unbeliever. (1 Timothy 5:8)

I will avoid foolish and ignorant disputes, knowing that they produce quarrels. As Your servant, Lord, I must not quarrel but be gentle toward all, able to teach and patient. (2 Timothy 2:23–24)

I will hold firmly to the faithful word as I have been taught, so that I can exhort others by sound doctrine and refute those who oppose it. (Titus 1:9)

I will remind others to be subject to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready for every good work, to slander no one, to be peaceable and gentle, and to show true humility toward all men. (Titus 3:1–2)

I will submit myself for Your sake, O Lord, to every human authority, whether to a king as being supreme, or to governors sent by him to punish evildoers and to praise those who do right; for it is Your will, O God, that by doing good I may silence the ignorance of the foolish. (1 Peter 2:13–15)

I will honor all people, love the community of believers, fear You, O God, and honor the king. (1 Peter 2:17)

I will not return evil for evil or insult for insult, but blessing instead, because to this I was called, that I may inherit a blessing. (1 Peter 3:9)

Husband or Wife

A virtuous wife is the crown of her husband, but she who causes shame is like decay in his bones. (Proverbs 12:4)

Houses and wealth are inherited from fathers, but a prudent wife is from You, Lord. (Proverbs 19:14)

Who can find a virtuous wife? She is worth far more than jewels. The heart of her husband trusts in her so that he has no lack of gain. She brings him good, not harm, all the days of her life. (Proverbs 31:10–12)

Love is as strong as death; its jealousy is as cruel as the grave; its flames are a blazing fire from You, O Lord. Many waters cannot quench love, nor can rivers overflow it. If a man were to give all the wealth of his house for love, it would be utterly scorned. (Song of Songs 8:6–7)

A husband should not break his promises to the wife of his youth, because she is a companion and a wife by covenant. Lord God of hosts, You seek a godly offspring and hate divorce; therefore we must take heed to our spirit and not break faith. (Malachi 2:14–16)

From the beginning of creation You made us male and female. For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and shall cleave to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh. So they are no longer two, but one flesh. Therefore what You have joined together, let no one separate. (Matthew 19:4–6; Mark 10:6–9)

The husband should fulfill his marital duty to his wife, and likewise the wife to her husband. The wife's body does not belong to her alone, but also to her husband. In the same way, the husband's body does not belong to him alone, but also to his wife. (1 Corinthians 7:3–4)

Wives should submit to their own husbands as to You, O Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, as You, O Christ, are the head of the church; and You are the Savior of the body. But as the church is subject to You, so wives should be to their husbands in everything. (Ephesians 5:22–24)

Each husband must love his own wife as he loves himself, and each wife must respect her husband. (Ephesians 5:33)

Wives should submit to their husbands, as is fitting in You, O Lord. (Colossians 3:18)

Husbands should love their wives and not be bitter toward them. (Colossians 3:19)

Marriage should be honored by all, and the marriage bed should be undefiled; for You, O God, will judge fornicators and adulterers. (Hebrews 13:4)

Husbands should be considerate as they live with their wives and treat them with respect as the weaker vessel and as coheirs of the grace of life. (1 Peter 3:7)

Children

Like Abraham, I should direct my children and my household after me to keep Your way, O Lord, by doing what is right and just. (Genesis 18:19)

I will learn to fear You all the days I live on the earth and teach Your words to my children. (Deuteronomy 4:10)

Your commandments will be upon my heart, and I will teach them diligently to my children and talk about them when I sit in my house and when I walk along the way and when I lie down and when I rise up. (Deuteronomy 6:6–7)

I will lay up Your words in my heart and in my soul and teach them to my children, talking about them when I sit in my house and when I walk along the way and when I lie down and when I rise up. (Deuteronomy 11:18–19)

I will discipline my children while there is hope and not be a willing party to their death. (Proverbs 19:18)

I will train up my children in the way they should go; even when they are old they will not depart from it. (Proverbs 22:6)

If I correct my children, they will give me rest; they will bring delight to my soul. (Proverbs 29:17)

I will not provoke my children to wrath but bring them up in Your discipline and instruction, O Lord. (Ephesians 6:4)

I will not provoke my children, or they will become discouraged. (Colossians 3:21)

Believers

How good and pleasant it is when brothers and sisters live together in unity! (Psalm 133:1)

Lord Jesus, You prayed these words for the unity of all who would believe in You: "I ask that all of them may be one, Father, just as You are in Me and I am in You, that they also may be in Us, that the world may believe that You sent Me. And the glory which You gave Me I have given to them, that they may be one, just as We are one: I in them, and You in Me, that they may be perfected in one, that the world may know that You have sent Me and have loved them, even as You have loved Me." (John 17:21–23)

Lord, may we imitate the faithfulness of the believers in Jerusalem, who continually devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. (Acts 2:42)

I want to speak words of encouragement to other believers. (Acts 20:2)

We must take heed to ourselves and to all the flock of which the Holy Spirit has made us overseers to shepherd Your church, O God, which You purchased with Your own blood. (Acts 20:28)

We have many members in one body, but all the members do not have the same function; in the same way we who are many are one body in You, O Jesus Christ, and individually members of one another. And we have different gifts, according to the grace You have given to us. (Romans 12:4–6)

I will pursue the things that lead to peace and to mutual edification. (Romans 14:19)

O God, You are the One who gives endurance and encouragement; grant that we be of the same mind toward one another, according to Christ Jesus, so that with one accord and one mouth we may glorify You, the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 15:5–6)

Since we were called into fellowship with You, Lord Jesus Christ, all of us should agree with one another, so that there may be no divisions among us, and that we may be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment. (1 Corinthians 1:9–10)

I will be careful not to let my liberty in You, O Christ, become a stumbling block to the weak. (1 Corinthians 8:9)

If someone is caught in a trespass, we who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness, watching ourselves, lest we also be tempted. (Galatians 6:1)

We should bear one another's burdens and so fulfill Your law, O Christ. (Galatians 6:2)

As we have opportunity, we should do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of faith. (Galatians 6:10)

In You, Christ Jesus, God's whole building is joined together and growing into a holy temple in You, Lord, in whom we also are being built together into a dwelling of God in the Spirit. (Ephesians 2:21–22)

We should bear with one another in love and make every effort to keep the unity of Your Spirit in the bond of peace. (Ephesians 4:2–3)

Grace has been given to each one of us according to the measure of Your gift, Christ Jesus. And You gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry so that Your body will be built up. (Ephesians 4:7, 11–12)

Lord Jesus Christ, grant that as Your body, we might reach unity of the faith and in the knowledge of You, the Son of God, so that we will become mature and attain to the whole measure of Your fullness. Then we will no longer be infants, being blown and carried by every wind of doctrine and by the cunning and craftiness of people who scheme deceitfully. Instead, we will speak the truth in love; we will grow up in every way in You, our Head. (Ephesians 4:13–15)

We are to put off falsehood and speak truthfully to our neighbors, for we are members of one another. (Ephesians 4:25)

We should submit to one another out of reverence for You, O Christ. (Ephesians 5:21)

If we have any encouragement from being united with You, O Christ, if any comfort from Your love, if any fellowship of the Spirit, if any affection and compassion, we should also be like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and one in purpose. (Philippians 2:1–2)

May we let Your word, O Christ, dwell in us richly as we teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as we sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in our hearts to You, our God. (Colossians 3:16)

We should always thank You, God, for other believers, mentioning them in our prayers. (1 Thessalonians 1:2)

We ought always to thank You, God, for other believers and pray that their faith would grow more and more, and that the love each of them has toward one another would increase. (2 Thessalonians 1:3)

We should always pray for other believers, that You, our God, may count them worthy of Your calling and fulfill every desire for goodness and every work of faith with power. (2 Thessalonians 1:11)

We should ask that Your name, our Lord Jesus, may be glorified in others, and they in You, according to the grace of our God and of You, Lord Jesus Christ. (2 Thessalonians 1:12)

You, O God, are not unjust; You will not forget our work and the love we have shown toward Your name in having ministered, and continuing to minister, to the saints. (Hebrews 6:10)

We should consider how to stir up one another toward love and good works. (Hebrews 10:24)

We must not forsake our meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encourage one another, and all the more as we see the day approaching. (Hebrews 10:25)

I will remember those who led me, who spoke Your word, O God, to me. I will consider the outcome of their way of life and imitate their faith. (Hebrews 13:7)

I will obey those who lead me and submit to them, for they keep watch over my soul as those who must give an account. I will obey them, so that they may do this with joy and not with grief, for this would be unprofitable for me. (Hebrews 13:17)

We should all be of one mind, and be sympathetic, loving as brothers and sisters, compassionate and humble. (1 Peter 3:8)

Unbelievers

How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim Your peace, who bring good tidings, who proclaim Your salvation. (Isaiah 52:7; Nahum 1:15)

You have called us to go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of You, the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe everything You have commanded us. And surely You are with us always, even to the end of the age. (Matthew 28:19–20)

We are Your fragrance, O Christ, to God among those who are being saved and among those who are perishing; to the one an aroma from death to death; to the other, an aroma from life to life. And who is sufficient for these things? (2 Corinthians 2:15–16)

All things are for our sakes, so that the grace that is reaching more and more people may cause thanksgiving to abound to Your glory, O God. (2 Corinthians 4:15)

Knowing what it is to fear You, O Lord, I seek to persuade others. (2 Corinthians 5:11)

All things are from You, O God, who reconciled us to Yourself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: namely, that You, O God, were reconciling the world to Yourself in Christ, not counting our trespasses against us. And You have committed to

us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, as though You, O God, were appealing through us, as we implore others on Christ's behalf to be reconciled to You, O God. (2 Corinthians 5:18–20)

I pray that words may be given to me, that I may open my mouth boldly to make known the mystery of the gospel. (Ephesians 6:19)

I pray that You, O God, may open to me a door for the word, so that I may speak the mystery of Christ and proclaim it clearly, as I ought. (Colossians 4:3–4)

I should walk in wisdom toward outsiders, making the most of every opportunity. My speech should always be with grace, seasoned with salt, so that I may know how to answer each person. (Colossians 4:5–6)

I am to offer petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving on behalf of all people—for kings and all those who are in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and reverence. This is good and acceptable in Your sight, O God our Savior, who desire all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. (1 Timothy 2:1–4)

I pray that the sharing of my faith may lead to a full knowledge of every good thing I have in Christ. (Philemon 6)

I will sanctify You, O Christ, as Lord in my heart, always being ready to give an answer to everyone who asks me to give the reason for the hope that is in me, but with gentleness and respect. (1 Peter 3:15)

I will have mercy on those who are doubting. (Jude 22)
